CANADIAN IS BEST SHOT IN WORLD

Major W. Hart McHarg Makse a 220 Out of a Possible 225 at Camp Perry Shoot—Wins First Honor.

CAMP PERRY, O., Sept. 5.—By winning the individual Palma match Thursday with an army rifle, Major W. Hart McHarg of Canada becomes the individual champion of the world by having a total of 220 out of possible 225 on the 800, 900 and 1,000 yard ranges.

Places were awarded according to merit. The best scores on the long distance range counted for first place, the next best for second place, etc.

Wolfe, U. S. Infantry, made 219; Osborn, U. S. navy, 218; J. S. Stewart, Massachusetts, 218; Duff, Texas, 218; McInnes, Canada, 218; W. A. Smith, Canada, 218; Morris, Canada, 217.

By winning the first place McHarg won a prize of \$50 in gold. Smith won \$40 and Mortimer \$31.25. Forty cash prizes were awarded and there were 159 entries. The Palma trophy will be shot for on Monday, Sept. 8.

In the shoot today members of the United States team, who will take part in the international match Saturday, made the following scores on the 300 metre ranges, the totals given being for the three positions, standing, kneeling and prone: Capt. Eddy, 658; Lieut. Knebel, 707; Capt. Heidenrich, 680; Artificer Sweeting, 677; Capt. Meeker, 650; Lieut. Col. Tewea, 665; Serg. Long, 698.

In the Palma team practice match the following are the five high men at the 800, 900 and 1,000 yard ranges: At 800 yards, C. A. McCormick, U. S. cavalry, heads the list with 75 plus 16; Lieut. H. Wilworth, U. S. cavalry, 75, plus 13; W. H. Richards, Ohio, 75, plus 8; Serg. J. McLee, Arizona, 75, plus 4; Lieut. B. G. Cynewith, S. U. engineers, 75, plus 3.

Meeting of Members of High School Squad Will be Held Monday—Practice Will Begin Following Day.

Edhart, Goghere, LaGrange, Hammond and one or two other teams will be met.

The second team will probably play Niles, Logansport, and Interlaken.

TRAVERS AND EVANS TO FIGHT FOR HONORS

Two Men Are Almost Certain to Take Part in the Golf Game on Saturday.

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Now that the National Amateur Golf championship tournament has reached the semi-final stage, it seems probable that the finalists who fought it out twelve months ago at Wheaton, Ill., will again face each other in the last match for the title next Saturday. These are, Jerome D. Travers, the national champion, and Charles Evans of the Edgewater G. C., Chicago.

Both seem likely winners in their respective matches Friday with J. G. Anderson of Braeburn, Mass., former champion of Massachusetts, and Fred Herzog, of the local club, who is entered from the Ekwanok club of Vermont.

While the matches in the third round Thursday were not productive of anything sensational, they tested the staying qualities of the players, as the weather was stifling hot during

ANOTHER AMERICAN BOAT WINS IN RACE

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., Sept. 5.—The Sprig, owned by John L. Saltonstall, Thursday won the third race in the international sloop yacht series. Each of the three American boats however won a leg in the Pres. Wilson cup.

The order of the finish was: Sprig, Eilon, Chma (all American boats) Angela IV, Serum, Wittelbach X, the last named turtling the fifth mark as the Sprig crossed the finish.

Whisker of air from the eastward, fore-runners, it was hoped, of the Hatteras hurricane, were ruffling Massachusetts bay when the German and American sloop yachtsmen hoisted sail Thursday for the third race of the international series.

An hour before the yachts left the harbor for the start off Half Way Rock, the wind had hit up a ten knot pace and for the first time since the series began there seemed every prospect of the brisk breeze which was regarded as giving the Germans an equal chance with their American opponents.

The race was over a 7-1-2 mile triangular course, twice around, with the first leg to windward.

WILL PUT BAN ON ALL DISHONEST BOXERS

MADISON, Wis., Sept. 5.—Negotiations for an agreement to bar boxers who are under the ban in any of the three states were opened Thursday by Wisconsin boxing commission with similar commissions in New York and Montana. Secy. Manning Vaughn of the Wisconsin commission asserted that such an understanding would insure the public against dishonest matches and would keep the boxing club.

If the plans of the Wisconsin commission are carried out any fighter who is not permitted to appear in the ring in Montana or New York, will not be allowed to box in Wisconsin and vice versa.

WAYNES WIN GAME IN A RECORD TIME

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Sept. 5.—Fort Wayne made it a clean sweep over Terre Haute in the latter club's final visit of the season at this point by winning Thursday's game in one hour and 15 minutes by a score of seven to nothing.
