### A. G. MANNING IS HURT IN COLLISION

Was Driving His Machine on Car Tracks and Endeavors to Turn Out For Car.

ELKHART, Ind., Sept. 12.—A. G. Manning, a well known retired farmer, sustained severe injuries and a Ford automobile he was driving was badly damaged at 11:15 o'clock Thursday morning, when a south bound Middlebury-Beardsley car struck the automobile on Main st., midway between Washington and Jefferson sts.

But a few hours before, an automobile driven by W. H. Foster collided with a milk wagon at almost the same place, but no damage was done.

Mr. Manning suffered a concussion of the brain, a scalp wound and minor injuries to his right leg. He was taken to his home, 417 N. Main st., where two physicians dressed his wounds. Although serious, the injuries are not considered dangerous.

Eye witnesses state that Mr. Manning was proceeding north along the tracks and while he was endeavoring to turn out of the way of the approaching car the engine "died." The impact hurled Mr. Manning through the windshield, his body striking the radiator and then rolling down to the pavement. It also turned the car directly about so that its hood faced the south.

Mr. Manning was in a dazed condition when picked up. He was taken to his home by Dr. Zimmerman in the latter's automobile.

The street car was in charge of Mr. Norman A. L. Houser and Conductor Albert Hershberger. Mr. Houser declares that he applied the brakes as soon as possible. He states that automobilists have cultivated a dangerous habit of using the space between the tracks until a car is almost upon them before getting out of the way.

### SUES FOR \$1,000 AS RESULT OF COLLISION

### WOMEN FORGOT TO DECLARE PROPERTY

Contents of Twenty Trunks Are Seized by Custom Officials at New York.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Custom inspectors seized Thursday the contents of 20 trunks brought from Europe last Friday on the steamer Mapatania by Mrs. Frank B. Wiberg of Cincinnati, wife of the former assistant secretary of commerce and labor, and her three daughters, the Misses Sarah, Olga and St. Hoyt Wiberg. Most of the contents of the trunks was wearing apparel.

It was thought that the Wibergs had merely forgotten to list all their foreign purchases and the trunks were sent to the appraiser's store. There the inspectors found the original cost of the undeclared goods to be about \$5,000, duty on which would be about \$1,000.

They so reported at a hearing Thursday and the case was placed in the hands of the United States district attorney for further action.

### GRASS STARTER OF FIRES


