

NO ADVANCE FOR THE CITY'S TAX LEVY NEXT YEAR

Council Fixes Figures at \$1.29 on the Hundred and Appropriates Funds at Monday's Meeting.

Funds for the various city departments amounting to \$352,493.18 were appropriated and an ordinance fixing the tax levy at \$1.29 on the hundred dollars of taxable property, the same rate as last year, was enacted at the meeting of the city council Monday night.

The appropriations show but little change over those of last year. The board of safety was granted an additional \$6,000 for the purchase of more motor driven vehicles for the fire department.

Since the city purchased its first motor driven vehicle for the fire department, Chief Grant has kept a close tab on the cost of operating the motor driven and the horse drawn vehicles and the smaller cost of the motor driven vehicles, caused him to recommend that four additional motor driven vehicles for the department be secured.

The ten per cent tax to be used in paying the city's cost of track elevation is included in the ordinances passed Monday night. This is the third year that the tax was included and with the receipts to be secured this year, the city officials hope to be able to start work on elevating the tracks next season.

The regular poll tax of fifty cents on each male inhabitant was fixed. The various appropriations were as follows:

Department of Finance. Old street improvement bonds \$12,500.00. Interest on old street improvement bonds 675.00.

Total fund \$13,175.00. Waterworks bonds 8,000.00. Interest on general purpose bonds 12,467.50. James Oliver Est. (city hall contract—city hall fund) 7,200.00.

Department of Public Safety. Police payroll \$54,090.00. Police miscellaneous 3,000.00. Salaries, board, clerk and surgeon 4,100.00.

Department of Public Works. Salaries \$5,600.00. Engineering 12,000.00. Streets and alleys 31,000.00. Street and alley intersections 10,000.00.

Department of Health and Charity. Salaries (board, clerk, inspector, etc.) \$3,205.68. Isolation hospital 2,000.00. Miscellaneous 2,000.00.

The committee on elections submitted a report recommending the locations for registration booths for Oct. 6, which was adopted. City Controller Joyce filed his report for August. The amount of cash on hand at the beginning of the month was \$249,802.46 and on the last day of the month it was \$214,067.55.

BIG INCOMES MUST PAY SEVEN PER CENT

Senate Conferees Win Fight When House Members of Committee Agree on Big Tax.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The senate conferees on the tariff bill late Monday won their fight for a heavier tax on big incomes, when the house members of the conferees committee agreed to accept the senate amendments, increasing the tax rate to a maximum of seven percent on incomes of more than \$500,000.

At the end of a day's consideration of the income tax, the committee had so nearly completed the section Monday night that the concluding details will be worked out by a subcommittee of the conferees. The amount of income that is to be free from tax fixed at \$4,000 by the house and \$3,000 by the senate; the exemptions to be allowed on account of families; and the provisions to be applied to mutual insurance companies are still at issue.

The deductions that are to be allowed from ordinary incomes, in arriving at the "net income" that is to bear tax, were accepted practically as determined upon in the senate. These deductions varied in several particulars from the provisions originally made by the house.

GIVES NEW RULING ON MANN SLAVE ACT

Federal Judge at Wichita, Kans., Holds That Commercial Feature Must Be Proven.

WICHITA, Kan., Sept. 23.—An interpretation of the Mann white slave act by Federal Judge John C. Pollock, that seemed at variance with that of Federal Judge Van Fleet of San Francisco in the Maury Dugas and F. Drew Camenetti trials, caused Lee Baker of Peabody, Kan., who was arraigned here Monday on a white slavery charge, to change his plea from "guilty" to "not guilty."

Baker, through his attorney, had pleaded guilty, when the judge asked: "Do you base this plea on the interpretation of the law in the Dugas case?" Baker's attorney replied that he did, and said he had expected the same ruling in this case.

"Under the law as I construe it," the judge said, "the commercial feature must be proved. It was not the aim of congress to prevent the personal escapades of any man. If the government cannot prove this man took the girl to another state for a commercial purpose, I shall instruct the jury to acquit him. The jurisdiction of the government in cases of this kind, is based on the commercial laws."

TO ATTEND CONVENTION Rt. Rev. John Hazen White Will Leave for New York Monday.

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There will be 165 bishops from the United States and her territories assembled in the body and over 800 clergy and laymen from churches in the same territory. The general convention is held every three years. It will hold probably three weeks. Important legislation regulating the churches will be enacted.
