

FIND BABE'S BODY IN BUILDING WALL

Another Chapter Added to the Stormy History of Col. Thomas Snell, Who Died Several Years Ago.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Sept. 26.—The mansion at Clinton, Ill., erected 40 years ago by Col. Thomas Snell, yielded another sensation Thursday when it was learned that the skeleton of a child in a home-made coffin had been found skillfully concealed within a wall.

The workmen threw the box with its contents into the yard, and it remained there two days before it was turned over to the police. A hurried inquest was held, an open verdict was returned and the town supervisor took charge of the body, burying it in the public cemetery.

"We have no idea as to how long the body has been in the wall," said O. F. Barr, Clinton's chief of police. "There was little flesh remaining and the box must have been concealed many years ago."

The story of Col. Snell's life was told in the courts at three trials when Richard Snell broke his father's will on the ground that the old man was of unsound mind. It was brought out that the lure of gold led at least one husband to consent to his wife's selling her affections to the banker, while both, it was said, connived in attempts to gain more gold, by holding out their 14-year-old daughter as a lure for the eccentric millionaire.

MORAL SUASION HAS SUCCESSFUL RESULT

President Holds That Attitude of United States is Responsible For Coming Election in Mexico.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—President Wilson took the position Thursday that the policy of "moral suasion" adopted by the United States toward Mexico had accomplished its two cardinal purposes—to obtain assurances that a safe would be a constitutional election and that Provisional Pres. Huerta would not be a candidate to succeed himself.

The president realizes that it will not be immediately possible to judge whether the processes of the election are actually constitutional, and will withhold decision for some time as to whether the choice of that election will be recognized by the United States.

CAME BACK AND LOOKED AT THE WORLD AFTER BEING DEAD TO IT FOR 43 YEARS

Pardoned after serving 43 years—the best years of his life—in a state penitentiary! Seeing the new world for the first time at 66—such is the experience of John Taborn, pardoned by Gov. Cox of Ohio! Why, it's like coming to life again after half a century of death!

When Taborn entered the state prison at Columbus in 1870 Grant was president. The telephone was unknown; electric lights were not dreamed of; there were no electric cars; skyscrapers in the largest cities were four or five-story buildings; Edison had not conceived the phonograph, while the flying machines and wireless telegraphy were the dreams of madmen. The United States navy consisted of a few iron clads and many wooden ships.

When he was pardoned Taborn was taken about Columbus by Warden Thomas secretary to see that he was not confused by the traffic and injured. He gazed in awe at the electric cars; he got lost in the revolving door of an office building; the height of which astonished him; he enjoyed his first ride in an elevator; he smoked a good cigar, but was puzzled by the safety matches, which would not ignite when scratched on his trouser leg; he heard a phonograph and talked over a telephone for the first time in his life.

Despite his 66 years, Taborn is active and has keen sight, reading without glasses. In the prison he learned three trades—that of machinist, shoemaker and molder—and plans to begin his last span of life as a machinist.

WANTS FULL PENSIONS FOR THE M. E. MINISTERS Marvin Campbell Makes Plea for Superannuated Pastors at Hammond Meeting.

Pearl Hettinger died from the effect of a rifle wound. She and Steffy were in a room when she was shot and Steffy declares the rifle, which was standing in a corner, fell to the floor and was discharged.

According to the charges filed against Steffy, he was engaged to Pearl and later was found to have a wife and children.

FOUR MORE ARRESTS MADE BY SWANSON

THE MEN INJURED IN THE fight were Steve Stochowski and three brothers, John, Pete and Steve Novadski. The affray occurred on a Saturday night in middle August. Two dances were in progress in the vicinity of Grant st. It is said that Bryzny's party induced the others to leave one dance hall and come to another where the former were holding forth. Shortly after the advent of the "guests" a quarrel started, resulting in the cutting.

William Solarek, progressive candidate for councilman during the pri-

mary campaign, was the second to be arrested for failure to file an expense account. John Clements, another progressive, was arrested Wednesday. It is said that both men filed statements of their expenses, but after the time limit set by law had expired.

John Kish was arrested charged in an indictment with criminal assault. A girl who is now in an Indiana institution will be the prosecuting witness against Kish. She is said to be under 16 years old.
