

LOCAL MINISTERS TO CONTINUE HERE

Only One Change Made at the Conference at Hammond — Rev. J. W. Bunch Will Have Charge of Epworth Memorial

J. W. Bunch, a graduate of the Northwestern university, now a student in the Garrett Biblical institution, was appointed pastor of the Epworth Memorial church to take the place of Rev. John F. Edwards, who has returned to his home at Boston, by the Northwestern Indiana conference which finished a week's session at Hammond, Ind., Monday noon.

This is the only change that will be made in the churches of this city. Mr. Bunch is a young man 25 years old. He is not married and will not live in the city until he has finished his course at the institute next June.

POSTOFFICE ROBBERED; ONE MAN IS CAPTURED

Henry Allen is Shot in the Thigh at West Springfield, O., by posse of Citizens.

CONNEAUT, O., Sept. 30.—Yegamen blew the postoffice safe at West Springfield, five miles east of here at 5 o'clock Monday morning and escaped with stamps and money estimated at \$1,000 by George Bristol the postmaster. The robbers had also ransacked Bristol's general store. The muffled report of the safe was heard in the neighborhood but did not attract anyone's suspicion. The yegs were seen carting their loot away and an alarm soon sounded, and a posse started in pursuit.

They were located in a shanty and a rifle ball fired through the side of the building penetrated one man's thigh. He was captured and almost bled to death before he could be brought to a hospital in this city and hemorrhage stopped. He said his name is Henry Allen and that his home is in Providence, R. I. He disclaims all knowledge of the robbery. No other arrests have been made and all trace of the robbers has been lost.

MANY HERE WILL PAY INCOME TAX

Estimated That 300 People Have Salaries or Incomes That Exceed Three or Four Thousand Dollars a Year.

Approximately 300 South Benders will have to keep strict account of their incomes for a report next spring when they must pay the tax collectors the first assessment of their income tax which is a part of the tariff bill.

At least there should be that number of persons whose annual income is more than \$3,000 in this city in proportion to the total number in the country who will be subject to the tax. The government officials have completed an investigation from which it is estimated that of the entire 90 millions of people 42,600 will be affected by the tax. This puts 300 South Benders in the class.

Of this 300 it is estimated that more than half, perhaps a great majority, come in the classification of \$3,000 to \$5,000. The positions paying from \$10,000 to \$15,000 are comparatively few although there are no doubt several who reach this mark and higher. The numerous manufacturing establishments with high salaried executives help to swell the limit. Owners of down town real estate, the rentals from which reach up into the thousands are not so few in South Bend. It is safe to say that most of the larger incomes are from property rather than from salaries.

SHORT HOURS WOULD MEAN WORK FOR ALL

Ultimate Aim is Six Hours a Day and Five and a Half Days a Week Says Tom Mann, British Labor Leader.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 30.—"The class war now being fought between labor and capital in the United Kingdom is not the dissatisfaction of a set of incapables, but the deliberate effort of serious minded men, fully conscious of the causes of their poverty and absolutely confident of their own ability to cure the same."

Tom Mann, the British labor leader, thus expressed himself at a mass meeting in a local amusement park Monday night.

"Standards in the lives of the workers in the United Kingdom," he continued, "have been raised more by direct industrial action during the last five years than by parliamentary action during the preceding 50 years."

"Similar action is being taken in the United States and at this hour greater activity is being shown by the American Federation of Labor than has been the case at any time during the last 20 years."

"The civilized world is confronted with the stupendous fact that an economic revolution is upon it. As one in favor of such a revolution I am pleased with the hearty reception I have received throughout the United States, and with the great freedom of speech which has been allowed me. I had thought it might be different."

"The all important purpose and the immediate aim of the movement I am advocating is the reduction of the hours of work internationally."

"Our ultimate aim is a six hour day and a five and a half day working week. This will eventually eliminate unemployment."

FORTY ARE KILLED.

ROSTOV, Russia, Sept. 30.—The tearing up of the rails by brigands has resulted in the wreck of a passenger train between Baku and Batumi. Six cars were destroyed and 40 persons were killed and a hundred injured.



NIGHT SCHOOL OPENS WITH SEVENTY PUPILS

Kolb will conduct a special class in vocal culture. R. J. McKenney has been secured to take charge of the mechanical drawing department which will be started later in Mishawaka.
