

MRS. W. H. AIRGOOD IS VICTIM OF DISEASE

Mrs. Lily Belle Airgood, wife of W. H. Airgood of 747 Harrison st., Elkhart, is dead of Bright's disease after a serious illness of but two weeks.

Mrs. Airgood, whose maiden name was Lily Belle Rose, was born in Grand Rapids, August 31, 1870. When a child she was brought to this city by her parents and resided here until her death. Her father, Ira M. Rose, a Lake Shore engineer, met death in an accident in the Toledo yards. On October 25, 1939, Miss Rose was married to Mr. Airgood at St. Joseph, Mich.

Mrs. Airgood, by her genial and helpful life, had become greatly endeared to a large circle of friends. She was a member of Progressive Hive, Macabees, and of the Methodist church. For a number of years she sang in the choir of St. John's Episcopal church.

Besides the husband, Mrs. Airgood is survived by a daughter, Helen Airgood, who was twelve years old Tuesday and a son, Robert Airgood, ten years old; her mother, Mrs. Honora Baker, who made her home with her.

RAILROAD CONDUCTOR IS SHOT BY HOBOES

ELKHART, Ind., Oct. 8.—Lake Shore Conductor Thomas Griffith of Toledo, well known railroader, was probably fatally shot at 12:45 o'clock Wednesday afternoon near Butler. Two of the four hoboes, who are believed responsible for the possible murder were rounded up by a posse of railroad men who at a late hour Wednesday night were still seeking the other two tramps.

Conductor Griffith, who was in charge of a slow drag headed toward Elkhart, attempted to eject the hoboes who opened fire upon him. Trainmen signaled the engineer to stop after seeing Griffith felled. He was found unconscious with four bullet holes in his body, one having passed through the intestines and another bored through the arm and shoulder. He was placed aboard a passing passenger train and taken to a Toledo hospital where he is said to be in a precarious condition tonight.

YOUTH IS GUILTY OF BREAKING OPEN CARS


ELKHART, Ind., Oct. 8.—Elmer Remington was found guilty of stealing merchandise from the Lake Shore railroad company last July by a superior court jury Tuesday afternoon. The penalty is ten to twenty years. Remington gave his age as 16. The verdict was read after the opening of court Wednesday morning. Attorney W. J. Lewis of Chicago, moved for a new trial, basing his motion on the fact that Jacob Domer, one of the jurors, is the father of Officer Domer who assisted in the arrest of Remington and testified against him. Arguments on the motion will be heard Monday.
