They are Archie Graham, local attorney and one time power among the republicans; John L. Moorman of Knox, editor of the Starke county Republican, and Perry Smith of Plymouth, one of the leaders in Marshall county republican politics.

According to reports from Starke county, Moorman is already an avowed candidate for the place. The other two men have as yet not said anything. According to John De Haven, chairman of the central committee, the 13th district has been rather overlooked in the past during the selection of the state committee men and the local men will attempt this time to land somebody from this end of the state on the committee.

Moorman has been invited to attend the meeting of the committee Wednesday night at which time the matter will be discussed in full and further arrangements made to start the ball rolling for the 13th district.

Plans were also made at the meeting to raise money to pay polling expenses on election day.

Reports were heard from various wards to the effect that the outlook for victory on election day is very promising.
