

BEST TEST OF GOD IS EXPERIENCE

At the St. Paul's church Rev. James L. Gardner, D. D., spoke on Sunday morning before a large audience on the theme, "The Highest Knowledge in the World."

He said: "I am sure you will all agree with me when I say that the highest knowledge in the world is the knowledge of the Highest. The highest and holiest being in the universe is God. The highest knowledge then is the knowledge of God. Jesus Christ went farther. He taught that not only was God the highest knowledge but that to know Him was the highest and best life. 'This' said Christ, 'is eternal life to know Thee the true God and Jesus Christ whom Thou hast sent.'"

"But how may we come to know God? We may learn something of Him through intuition. We do not enter the world without some ray of light. There is a light that excuseth or accuseth. Man is naturally a religious being. Men primarily believe in God. But alas we know that intuition has led men to worship gods made with their own hands. It is therefore not a safe guide.

Men have tried to know God by reason. Romans tried to find God through his intellect alone and failed. 'Can a man by searching find out God' asked Job long ago. Many men who have followed the light of reason alone have been led into infidelity or agnosticism.

"A man may learn something of God through the book of nature. Nature is man's religious book with lessons for him for each day. Jesus said, 'Consider the lilies of the field.' The lilies of the field and every flower that grows should remind us of God.

But the great book on religion is the Bible. It is God's highest, sanest and best revelation to the children of men. It is an infallible guide on the subject of religion. It reveals to us Jesus Christ, man's Savior and man's highest example and says 'Follow Him.'"

"But the final test of God is not through intuition or reason, or nature or even the Bible. The ultimate test of knowledge of God is human experience. The Bible is largely a record of human experience. It is the record of God's dealings with humans."

At the evening service Rev. James L. Gardner spoke on the subject, "The Young Man and His Battle with His Doubts." In speaking on this theme the speaker said there were two classes of doubters, dishonest and honest. The sermon was addressed to the latter class. He showed that much of present day doubt arose because young men misunderstood Christianity. He set forth a logical argument that there was no incompatibility between Christianity and the highest type of true manliness and that religion of Christ did not conflict as many young men believe with the known facts of science. He showed that Christianity was not opposed to all amusements. "It is only opposed to those amusements and diversions that cannot be taken in the name of Jesus."

He closed the sermon by saying there were many things about the Bible that we might not be able to understand fully but that every young man who was at all acquainted with the teachings of Christ knew full well the kind of life he was called to live—a life honest, pure and noble.

The Rev. Mr. Gardner will close this series to young men next Sunday evening when he will speak on the theme, "The Young Man's Battle for Wife and Home."

FOUR TICKETS IN FIELD

Lafayette City Campaign Becoming More Exciting.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Oct. 20.—The political situation in Lafayette is becoming more exciting and it is now certain there will be four tickets to be voted for in the city election to be held Nov. 4. William W. Ullrich, who was nominated for mayor in the mass meeting of citizens ten days ago, but whose nomination was not acted upon because the committee of 20 had recommended Thomas Bauer, is being boosted now with a petition. The socialists have also decided to place a ticket in the field and have nominated Arthur Lehr for mayor. The race between George R. Durgan, the democratic nominee, and Thomas Bauer of the citizens' ticket promises to be close.

DANIELS PLEASUED WITH ATLANTIC WAR GAME

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Secy. Daniels and his party returned to Washington on the presidential yacht Mayflower after witnessing the Atlantic fleet engage in battle practice off the Virginia Capes. The secretary expressed himself as greatly impressed with the success of the war game.

"My only regret," he said, "was the absence of Pres. Wilson and Secy. Bryan, but they have promised to go next spring. I was very much pleased indeed, with the efficiency, and preparedness of the officers, men and ships. 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RAPS THOSE WHO DENY THERE IS SIN

Philosophers' theories that sin does not exist and that man is not to blame, but his ancestors, were ridiculed Sunday night at the First Christian church by Rev. George W. Henry in a sermon entitled "Leopard Spots and How to Change Them". "Sin is present nevertheless," said the pastor, "no matter what name it goes by, be it called 'undeveloped good' or 'sin'. This is merely a juggling of words and will not help society. The whole theory is contrary to scripture, common sense and moral sense."

Humanity needs present help, he said, and not far spun theories of sociologists. "Some claim eugenics will help the world but this is not much help to the man born already who has made a mistake in choosing his parents. The only way to cure evil is to be born again by getting in touch with Christ. This has been known to cure the individual mind and social minds of a nation."

At the morning services Rev. Mr. Henry gave a report from the international convention of the disciples of Christ recently held at Toronto, Can. According to Dr. Henry it was reported at the meeting that there is more money now in the missionary field than workers. A reverse of the situation years ago. The problem before the churches, he said, is to keep Mohammedism from sweeping over Africa from the north and to prevent China from going from paganism to infidelity and agnosticism.

Now has come the time when a girl shows even more of her throat than she has this summer, and she finds that it is tanned and ugly.

A very distinguished artist of my acquaintance, after glancing over an assemblage of women in evening dress, said: "I wonder why most women pay so much attention to their faces and so little to the remainder of their rhodies."

"Look about you," he continued, "and you will not see ten beautiful throats in this room, although I will say that since the edict of fashion has been 'no collars' there has been an improvement in the neck of the average woman."

"It is harder work to take care of your throat than your face. Even if you patronize a beauty shop you will find that the operator only gives your throat the most superficial care while she expends a full hour on your face. For the girl whose throat is scrawny and not smooth there is nothing better than to anoint it at night with cold cream and then pin a piece of kid about it."

You know how beautifully smooth the wearing of kid gloves at night, after you have rubbed them with cold cream, makes your hands. Well, the kid about your throat acts in the same way. It keeps your throat in a slight perspiration for hours.

You can take the end of a long kid

glove that is worn out for this purpose. Always rub your throat from the chin back to the ears and from the chin down toward the bust and back to the arm pits.

If you have a fat neck pick up little pieces of the flesh and roll it between the thumb and first fingers. Don't do this too strenuously, and after you have gone over your whole throat in this manner pat it with a cloth wet in spirits of camphor.

There is nothing better to whiten the throat than a pint of whey of sour milk. To this add a half ounce of peroxide and ten drops of benzoin. You can add a little of your favorite perfume if you object to the odor of sour milk.
