SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 21.—Joking and laughing with the boat crew that followed her, "Babe" Wright, a 12-year-old girl, recently swam the Golden Gate, smashing all previous women's records. Her time was 35 minutes and 12 seconds.

Mrs. Roy H. Wright, "Babe's" mother—Walter Hartman, Eddie Hart and Carl Hackfield started with "Babe". Hartman and Hart gave out. Hackfield finished in 31 minutes and Mrs. Wright in 35 minutes 12 seconds. "It was easy," said Miss Wright. "The swim was not long enough. The

terrible tide rips I have heard so much about didn't bother me. "Chinese currents"—the cold streaks—gave most trouble. I used the single overhand stroke."
"My daughter would have beaten me out had the distance been much longer," declared Mrs. Wright, herself a celebrated swimmer.

SUFFRAGE QUESTION BEFORE CONVENTION

Mrs. McWhirter, President of State Federation of Clubs, Makes a Plea For Votes For Indiana Women.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 22.—Whether the Indiana Federation of Clubs will endorse officially woman's suffrage, promises to be the most important subject before the seventh annual convention of the federation which opened here Tuesday. In her opening address Mrs. Felix T. McWhirter, president, made a plea for suffrage.

The convention was opened by Gov. Samuel M. Hinton, who made the address of welcome.
Mrs. McWhirter made the plea for the ballot from the standpoint of the welfare of her children, but who because of being denied the ballot was unable to voice her opinion of civic conditions. Mrs. McWhirter said:
"Paramount of all interests of woman," she said, "is that of the child. Mothers' clubs, parents-teachers clubs, mothers' congress are expressions of a deep significance. The welfare of the child—its right to be well born, its right not only to a good heredity but to wholesome environment, with playtime and education, has demanded the attention of philosophers, philanthropists, scientists, statesmen and legislators.
"When a mother follows with her love and interest her child into the street and into the school and community environment she realizes that, although she has given of her best self to the care and training of that child, when it crosses the threshold of the home it goes out into an environment so different, an environment maintained and controlled without reference to the mother's point of view, an environment over which the mother has absolutely no control."
Realizes Condition.
"The educated, intelligent women recognize this condition—they real-

ize that they have no voice concerning the conditions in the community—no voice in the plans for the schools, no voice in municipal affairs, regardless of how they affect them and their property interests.
"Who can represent a woman's longing for civic conditions that will take away the pernicious influence of the saloon, the dance hall and the red light district? who but a mother can represent a mother's heart in its anxiety for the welfare of her child?
"No man will ever be elected president of the United States who does not stand on a platform declaring for woman suffrage as the electoral vote of some of the ten states which have enfranchised their women will be necessary to the election.
"We believe in living yage, an eight hour day, court of conciliation and arbitration—an equal standard of morals for men and women and uniform and sane marriage and divorce laws."

LACOPA FOUND GUILTY OF ASSAULTING YOUTH

Sentence Will be Imposed on Him Today for Shooting of Joseph Stakere.

Dominic Lacopa, 19-year-old boy, was found guilty of assault and battery on Joseph Stakere, another Italian youth, by a jury in the circuit court Tuesday afternoon. The jury was out about 15 minutes.
Lacopa shot Stakere in a running fight on W. Washington av., last August. It was said they had quarreled over a pint of beer. The verdict places Lacopa liable to a verdict of two to 14 years in the reformatory. Sentence will be imposed Wednesday afternoon unless the defendant's attorney files a motion for a stay of judgment.

MEXICAN GIRLS ARE REAL POCAHONTESSES

Throw Themselves in Front of Americans Sentenced to be Shot and Save Lives According to Refugees' Stories.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 22.—Tales of alleged outrages in the state and city of Durango, Mex., were related Tuesday at Red Cross headquarters by refugees who arrived on the transport Buford Monday from Gulf of California ports.

"One of the worst outrages discussed on board the Buford," Mrs. Mary Towelston, Durango, enroute to Carrizozo, N. M., was "that inflicted on a young American and his wife at Durango. The revolutionists of Gen. Carranza seized the couple in their home. They roped the husband fast and tied his wife to her bed where they finally killed her."
"Twenty-seven Americans were lined up against a building in Durango to be shot by the rebels, but just as the first man was to be executed, a Mexican maid rushed in front of him and pleaded for his life. Other Mexican girls joined in the plea for mercy and the Americans were spared."
"While there has been some restraint in the tendency to rob and murder so far as Americans are concerned, no mercy is shown rich Mexicans. All through Durango the fine residence of the rich have been turned into stables by the rebels. It is common to see mansions with horses' heads protruding from the parlor windows, while the wives of rebel soldiers parade in fine silk gowns, displaying all manner of jewelry."
"Whatever the rebels seize and cannot use immediately they burn to prevent its recapture."
One man reached Manzanillo from Durango entirely naked, according to the refugees.
Another, W. I. Dawson, who started with \$1,100, reached Guaymas with only a shirt and a pair of trousers, the rebels having robbed him of even his shoes, hose and hat.

JUDGE SUSTAINS MOTION IN THE WATSON CASE

Defendant Claimed That Indictment Robbed Him of Constitutional Rights.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Oct. 22.—Judge Foster in United States district court here Tuesday afternoon sustained the motion of counsel for Thomas E. Watson, the Thomson editor, lawyer and politician to quash the indictment against him, charging the sending of obscene matter through the United States mails.
This motion, presented Monday by S. Guy McLendon, chief of counsel for Mr. Watson, charged that to try him on this indictment would be to

deny him his constitutional rights as a citizen and the clause granting freedom to the press.
The indictment of Mr. Watson was the outgrowth of publications in the Jeffersonian attacking the Catholic church's confessional and the oath taken by initiates in the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic fraternity.

WILL WORK CONVICTS

Illinois Prisoners to Try Their Hands at Road Making.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 22.—Gov. Dunne Tuesday afternoon wired to Warden Allen of the Joliet penitentiary requesting that 25 convicts be sent to Springfield to work on roads near the state fair grounds. Gov. Dunne refused to allow the men to come here during the fair, owing to the fear that they would be annoyed

by fair visitors who might swarm to the camp and watch the convicts at work.
