BATTLE IN MORROCO.
PARIS, Nov. 1.—Twenty-five French soldiers and sixty Moroccan rebels were killed in a battle in French Morocco, according to a war office despatch from Tangier Saturday. The rebel tribesmen in French Morocco have been reinforced and have been making a fresh campaign against the French.

BOTH NEW YORK SIDES CONFIDENT

Fusion Leaders Claim Mitchell Will Win by Plurality of 50,000 — Tammany Make Similar Claim.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—With New York's most arduous campaign rapidly nearing its climax and the election but two days away, managers of the rival political factions Saturday put out claims that were distinctly contradictory.
Conservative estimates of fusion leaders place the candidacy of John Purroy Mitchell, fusion nominee for mayor, at approximately 50,000. Tammany leaders claimed almost as great a plurality for their marjority nominee, Judge Edward McCall.

The following tabular predictions were uttered by the leaders: Robert Adamson, campaign manager for Mitchell—Mitchell will be elected by probably 55,000, but some of my more conservative co-workers place their estimates at 50,000. The radicals predict as high as 100,000 for Mr. Mitchell but for myself I struck a medium.
Joseph Johnson, campaign manager for McCall—McCall ought to beat the 60,000 plurality by which McClellan won in 1903. I would not be surprised to see his plurality reach 75,000.

Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall—I see no reason to change my estimate of 150,000 for McCall.
James I. Martin, former Tammany leader, now working for fusion—Mitchell's plurality may reach 100,000. In the bitter warfare which has marked the campaign the fight which has been conducted by Charles Edward Russell, socialist nominee for mayor, has been completely overshadowed. Mr. Russell, who was formerly the socialist candidate for governor, said he did not expect to be elected, but predicted that the socialist vote in the history of the city would be cast.

ARTIST CONCERT COURSE.
The Artist Concert course announced by the South Bend Conservatory, opens Monday evening, Nov. 10, at the Oliver Opera House, with a joint recital by Richard Czerwonky, violinist, and Mabel Corlew-Smith, soprano. Max H. Wald will be the accompanist. Mrs. Smith possesses a soprano voice of most exceptional quality, range and fullness. She has recently come from comparative obscurity in the class of many to be one of the best artists in the country. Her vocal equipment permits her to do unlimited work of the higher order and her musical mentality is in keeping with the natural equipment. Her singing of "The City of the Future" on last year's course has not been surpassed by any other artist visiting the city. This program will give her opportunity in two groups of songs.
The second number of the course will be unique in the annals of musical events for this city. We will see and hear in lecture and pianistic effort, America's leading composer, Charles Wakefield Cadman. Mr. Cadman has written much good music but his particular fame has come about through his thorough acquaintance with the folk-lore of the North American Indian. Besides this talk Mr. Cadman will, with the assistance of Mr. Van Aiken and Hans Roeder, recast a new trio of his own composition. Mr. Griffith will also assist in illustrating his Indian songs, based on original themes. This number will be given on Friday evening, Nov. 21. He will also give this lecture before the students at St. Mary's academy on Saturday afternoon. On the evening of Nov. 20 Mr. Cadman will appear before the Woman's Literary club.
The third number of the course will be given on Tuesday evening, Dec. 16, by three artists: Clarence Eldam, pianist; Jennie F. W. Johnson, contralto and Grant Kimbel, tenor, all from Chicago. These artists are all new to the concert public of this city but are vouchered for as being first class by the management.
On Monday evening, Jan. 19, will return in joint recital the exceedingly popular artists, Lucille Stevenson, soprano, and Marion Green, basso-cantante.
The course will close on Monday evening, March 2, with a grand concert by the Steindel Trio. The season tickets are now on reservation at the Conservatory office.

Red Lights and Fire Mark Big Highway Celebration

South Bend and Mishawaka were placed on the Lincoln national highway Friday night in a trail of fire and a blaze of glory.
A pile of boxes heaped in a monster bonfire illumined the field east of Springfield park while United States Sen. B. P. Shively unveiled the roadway marker before large crowd, following the biggest automobile parade ever seen in South Bend or Mishawaka.
One of the most spectacular sights ever viewed in the county was that afforded the Mishawaka delegation who arrived at the spot first and watched the South Benders, each automobile illumined with red fire winding down the road in an enormous glow worm parade. It was estimated that 500 autos took part in the dedication.
It was South Bend and Mishawaka's part in a great national movement. For at the same hour from New York to Frisco similar fires were being lit, and the longest highway from ocean to ocean flames leaped to the skies, 3,000 miles of bonfires, a national highway of flame.
The crowds gathered down town early in the evening. Every one who had a car had it out. Those who didn't have cars went out by street car. M. L. Williams as master of ceremonies, passed the great line as it stretched out Main st. perfecting the formation and giving each driver some red fire to be kept alight during the parade.
The word was given and the parade started out Vista av. along the river to Springfield.
The red fires had died down as the autos de-bouched into the field and formed a great semi-circle around the bon fire. Then the torch was laid to the oil impregnated pile and the flames shooting skyward with greater and greater intensity revealed a great mass of humanity.
Sen. Shively spoke briefly before formally unveiling the official marker, praising the good roads movement as one of the most important of the day.
