
NELLIE GRANT SARTORIS, ANOTHER "WHITE HOUSE BRIDE."

CROSS STITCH EMBROIDERY.

Any little girl of eight or ten can embroider a towel for mother in cross stitch from the pattern shown here. Mother will probably remember when she made cross stitch embroidery. If she doesn't grandmother will. The stripe across the towel is made of two shades of blue mercerized crewels. Use the lightest in the stitches that are marked with a cross and the darkest on the little squares. Now make the cross stitches of green in the bouquets and the four stitches that are marked with the horizontal line of light pink and the little squares of dark red. Big sister will show you how to "button hole" the edges of the towel or may be she will do it for you in plain white cotton.

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WEDDING GIFTS BEGIN TO ARRIVE

Room Set Aside in White House Filling With Handsome Gifts —Miss Wilson Wears Diamond Studded Watch.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Gifts are piling into the white house from all directions and many notables are making the tour of the Washington shops trying to select suitable tokens. The chiefs of the more important missions already have forwarded their gifts. A few are awaiting the arrival of consignments from New York before making a final decision.

Interesting articles in the fast filling gift room at the white house are a wonderful set of four candlesticks, sent by the ambassador of Italy, Marchese Cusani Confalonieri. Of Etruscan design, the candlesticks, which are about 12 inches high and weigh about four pounds each, are carved elaborately in an intricate design of festoons.

The ambassador of Germany and Countess von Bernstorff gave to Miss Wilson two antique sugar shakers of great beauty.

The Russian ambassador and Mme. Bakmeteff sent one of the most unusual gifts in the collection. It is an umbrella handle formed of a semi-precious Siberian stone of pear color held in an intricate tracery of silver, handsomely embellished with Russian enamel in various colors.

Following a custom observed on the occasion of every white house wedding in the past century, the republic of France has sent a gift, but the nature of it has not been revealed at the embassy. Many of the chiefs of missions are sending floral gifts, baskets and bouquets of every sort having been ordered by those whose acquaintance with Miss Wilson is of short duration. Among those who will send flowers are the minister of Norway and Mme. Bryn, the minister of Costa Rica, Senor Don Joaquin Bernardo Calvo and Senora Dona de Calvo, the minister of Bolivia, Senor Don Ignacio Calderon and Senora Dona de Calderon, the minister of the Dominican republic, Senor Dr. Don Francisco J. Peynado and Senora de Peynado, and the minister of Guatemala, Senor Don Joaquin Mendez and his daughter, Senora Dona Luz-Mendez. Dr. Mendez and Senora Luz-Mendez will present their floral gift in a silver receptacle, the design being now under consideration.

On Monday afternoon the minister of Panama and several chiefs of South American missions will meet to decide upon what form their tribute to Miss Wilson shall take.

Miss Wilson's engagement ring, which she wears without a guard ring, is a diamond solitaire of medium size, clear and white, held in a Tiffany setting of conventional design. Miss Wilson is wearing a diamond-studded bracelet watch which is one of her wedding gifts from a close relative.

The president and Mrs. Wilson, it is said, have furnished the 12 roomed home, Williamstown, Mass., which the bride and bridegroom will occupy after their marriage. In addition members of the president's family have bestowed upon the first bride in the family circle, many silver, several pieces of which have additional value as heirlooms.

At the white house today it was asserted that there was no foundation whatever for the report of the engagement of Miss Margaret Wilson and Dr. Gilbert Horrax of Boston, who will be one of the ushers at the wedding of Miss Jessie Wilson and Mr. Sayre.
