ARE GOOD UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

Declarations of intention to become citizens of the United States issued prior to June 29, 1906, will be good "until further notice." That was the statement of Martin Sturgis, chief of the naturalization bureau at Chicago, who was in South Bend this week to conduct the hearings of applicants for second papers.
 The validity of the "first papers" issued before 1906 was in question owing to the operation of a federal statute which went into effect last September, declaring declarations void after seven years from the passage of the act. The bill was passed in June, 1906.
 Chief Sturgis authorized County Clerk Christoph to accept such declarations as were made before 1906 without question for the present. Declarations made after 1906 will, of course, be void when seven years old, if the applicant does not avail himself of the opportunity of applying for second papers.
 Sturgis' statement is taken as an authoritative settlement of the difficulty, for the time at least, inasmuch as he is the head official in the Chicago office.
 Sixty-four of the applicants for citizenship were admitted before Judge Funk during the hearings here, 22 cases were continued and nine were dismissed.

GIRL CONTENDS SHE KILLED SWEETHEART

Stepfather and Half Brother Are Accused of Crime by State Despite Her Version of Affair.
 CROWLEY, La., Nov. 21.—Selection of the jury was completed here Thursday for the trial of eighteen year old Dora Murf, her stepfather, James Duval, and her half brother, Allie Duval, all charged with murdering J. M. Delahaye, the girl's sweetheart. The girl says she fired the fatal shot, but the state will try to prove that the stepfather was responsible for the killing.
 Delahaye was killed on a street here Oct. 15, the shots coming from a surrey in which the three accused were riding. A charge from a shotgun felled Delahaye. As he dropped the girl jumped from the surrey brandishing a revolver and fired two shots into the prostrate form. Then she stooped over the dead body and called the victim endearing names.
 The girl says she fired all the shots and alone is to blame. The state charges Duval handled the shotgun, and that the first shot killed Delahaye.
 Because of threats heard against James Duval, the defense lawyers attempted to have every one entering the court room searched, but Judge W. Campbell, presiding, ruled this precaution unnecessary.

BABE OVERTURNS LAMP; IS BURNED TO DEATH

Parents Leave Tot in Room and He Pulls Cloth From the Table.
 ELKHART, Ind., Nov. 21.—John G., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Weaver, ten miles south of Elkhart near the Oakland av. road, was burned to death in the kitchen of the Weaver home about 6 o'clock Wednesday evening. The child would have been one year old Jan. 30.
 The fire was started by a lamp that had been left on a table. It is presumed the little one pulled the table's oil-cloth cover off, or hit the lamp with a corn popper.
 The tragedy occurred while the parents were at the barn, ten rods from the house. A brother, two and a half years old, was sleeping in an adjoining room.
 Conditions that Coroner J. C. Mast regards as something only a little less than miraculous caused the fire to exhaust itself after consuming the child's clothing, part of the table-cloth, part of his high chair and the kitchen table, and blistering the paint on all sides of the room besides shattering the panes of one window. He thinks the fact that the room was tightly closed and that the wind was still, combined to cause the blaze to die out before igniting more inflammable portions of the house or furnishings.

IS FIRM CANDIDATE TO SUCCEED RALSTON

Cong. J. A. M. Adair Going to Run for Congress in Eighth District First.
 INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 21.—Cong. John A. M. Adair of Portland came to town Thursday and announced that he will be a candidate next year for congressman from the eighth district and that as soon as he is elected he will become a full fledged candidate for the democratic nomination for governor in 1916.
 "I do not wish to be placed in the attitude of being a candidate for two nominations at the same time," he said, "but my friends know I am going to run for congress again next year and that I will be a candidate for governor in 1916. In making my campaign for governor I shall not reject the support of any democrat."
 "If there is a democratic machine in this state I want it to be for me, but I will not be a machine candidate or the candidate for any set of men. But I want to say that if there is a machine and it does not support me I will be a candidate just the same and make my fight, machine or no machine."

FINE OF \$2,000 STANDS

David C. Norcross Will Not Have to Serve Time in Jail.
 SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Contempt of court sentence of an indefinite prison term and \$2,000 passed on David C. Norcross, secretary of the Western Fuel Co., for failure to produce the books of the company before the federal grand jury, was upheld Friday in the U. S. circuit court of appeals. The prison sentence will not be enforced, however, if the books are forthcoming before Dec. 20, although the fine stands in any event.

WILL BE ABLE TO GET TOBACCO IN FUTURE

Convict Who Stabbed Another to Death is Sentenced to Michigan City.
 JEFFERSON CITY, Ind., Nov. 21.—Edward Morton, the convict in the Indiana reformatory who stabbed to death Charles Bartle, a fellow inmate, in the hopes that for the crime he would be transferred to the Michigan City penitentiary where he would be allowed plenty of tobacco, had his wish gratified Thursday.
 A jury which heard his case returned a verdict fixing his punishment at life imprisonment in Michigan City. In testifying Morton said he began using tobacco at the age of eight and the craving for the weed affected him so he was not responsible when he killed Bartle.
