

CINCINNATI SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA. For the first time in South Bend the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra will present a program under the direction of their new conductor, Dr. Ernst Kunwald, at the high school auditorium on Thanksgiving night.

ALL WAS BUSTLE AT WHITE HOUSE

Executive Mansion Put in Readiness for Ceremony—Wedding Party Rehearses—Dinner Dance on Yacht Tonight.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—All was bustle and excitement about the white house Monday—the day before the wedding of the president's daughter, Miss Jessie Wilson. Florists who arrived with flowers, expressmen were hurrying too and fro with packages containing eleven-hour gifts, the curious were gathered to watch the entrance of the executive mansion for a chance view of bride-elect or other figures in the ceremony and the principals themselves were prepared for the wedding rehearsal.

The maid of honor, the bridesmaids and the four ushers will take their stations as though in the actual ceremony and Mrs. Wilson will review the spectacle and offer suggestions.

Aside from this affair, Washington society was chiefly concerned with the dinner dance to be given tonight aboard the president's yacht, Mayflower, moored in the Potomac. The vessel is a bower of roses, smilax, palms and its decks are roped off with cables of green, from which at nightfall will twinkle myriads of colored incandescant lights, transforming the official craft into a fairy palace.

Music by Marine band will time the steps of the pick of the young officialdom for perhaps the gayest function of the whole pre-nuptial season.

Speculation as to the direction of the wedding journey is heightened by the presence of the Mayflower in the river. Wives of some officials think that Miss Jessie may have obtained permission to sail away on the historic craft. Others say the journey has been arranged and that it is to be southward by train.

HYGENIC FASHION SCHOOL

South Bend Woman Attends Lectures in Chicago.

Miss Myrtle Herring, of the Ellsworth Store, has returned from Chicago where she attended the Hygienic-Fashion School. Miss Herring in an interview regarding the purpose of the lectures said:

"The School was in charge of Dr. Dunn of New York City and Miss McNulty of Boston, both very able corsetiers. Daily there were sessions of formal fittings on living models, demonstrating the proper adjustment of corsets from a health standpoint.

"Most interesting and instructive, too, were the lectures on anatomy and hygiene in relation to proper corset fitting. The general discussions of the great importance of medical fittings in a corset department aroused much interest among the corsetiers."

"Special emphasis was placed on teaching the customer how to adjust her corsets properly after leaving the fitting room. The big idea was this: 'We should be teachers' not merely fitters in order to be successful corsetiers.'"
