CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Heroic methods were authorized Tuesday in the case of Thomas W. Evans, a wealthy graduate of the Moody Bible institute, who took several bichloride of mercury tablets in the darkness of his home on Monday night believing them to be a headache cure.

Dr. Thomas A. Carter has been given authority to operate and remove Evans' kidneys and wash them in a final effort to save his life.

The operation will be the first of its kind in Chicago.
