WANTS RECEIVER FOR OWLS

LES MISERABLES

Victor Hugo's masterpiece, "Les Miserables", the life story of Jean Valjean, was shown in motion pictures before a large and appreciative audience last evening.

The story of the persecuted fugitive from justice, his bitter trials and wonderful escapes, are familiar to the reading public. In this busy era when many fail to find time to peruse books that extend to three or four volumes, the modern method of picture-story telling offers a pleasing and speedy way to acquire profitable information.

From a student's standpoint, as well as from the entertainment view, "Les Miserables" is a most instructive play. The interpretation of the story could not have been placed in better hands for it is enacted by a splendid cast of French stars.
