

'Civilized Women Aborigines' Declares This Indian Woman



Nakeetna Nahemls, civilized Indian, at her typewriter in her chosen Indian garb. PORTLAND, Ore., March 9.—Nakeetna Nahemls is a Yakima Indian. From time immemorial her forebears adorned themselves with war-pump, furs, animal teeth and claws. And Nakeetna, like her forebears, had, during her childhood, also adorned herself with war-pump, war colors and furs. But when Nakeetna grew older she was sent away to school, to learn the ways of the white man. When she came back to her people she was "civilized." Did she bring the dress customs of the white man with her? No, she did not. Instead she put on her white woman's clothes and put on her Indian jacket. Nakeetna is proud of her ability as a stenographer, but not any less proud of her featherskin clothes.






