

# STUDENTS WILL AID IN REPAIR OF NILES ROAD

### Will Run Lines and Prepare for Big Work of Next Thursday. All Arrangements Are Completed Says Committee.

After a meeting of the executive committee on the improvement of the Niles road, in the Chamber of Commerce last night, it was stated by City Engineer Moore, chairman of the committee, that active work upon the reconstruction would begin Thursday, May 21. However, the county roller and the scarifier will be used Wednesday over the five miles that is to be worked, in order to loosen up the hard ground and to clear it of bumps.

The engineering class of 20 at Notre Dame university has promised its assistance through Prof. McCue, who was present at the meeting last night. The students will run lines and levels, and will make profiles of the road. Their work, it has been promised to City Engineer Moore, will be finished in time for the work to begin on Thursday.

The five miles of road will be divided into three sections. A competent engineer will be in charge of each. County Surveyor Henderson McClelland will have charge of the first section, and W. E. Graves, assistant city engineer, and A. J. Hammond, former city engineer, will have the supervision of the other two.

The 20 quarter-mile stretches into which the road has been divided will be supervised by a competent road foreman. Sixteen of the 20 sections have been provided for in subscriptions by farmers living along the route, and the other four are expected to come in shortly. Even if subscriptions are not secured, the committee will have funds to finish the work.

### Road Graders Supplied.

Various contractors have supplied six road graders to round off the road. The city road roller and sprinker will be used to roll the road after it has been graded up.

County Agent J. S. Bordner has arranged for suitable gravel, which will be taken from pits at Roselawn and from a pit near the state line. The gravel from Roselawn is donated, while the other is being paid for by the trustee of Clay township, Joseph Wolfe.

Bordner in an address before the meeting last night said that the spirit among the farmers along the road was at a high point of enthusiasm. "We will have more than 18 teams that will cost the township nothing," he said. "At least that many have promised me the use of their teams. Brother Leo of Notre Dame is also very much interested in the project. He has promised us the use of the college farm's large tractor and grader."

That the work will now go on without a hitch, was the prediction of City Engineer Moore last night. "There is nothing to hinder now," he said. "We have the promise of the labor, and we have competent men to supervise the actual labor entailed."

The executive committee is composed of the following: W. E. Moore, chairman; L. S. Hammerschmidt, B. S. Walters, Louis Kuhn, J. S. Bordner, M. L. Williams and John Russell. Miss Julia Cole is chairman of the committee that is to provide lunch. The committee has arranged with O. A. Clark of Kable's restaurant to provide 20 tables, one for each quarter-mile stretch, and waiters for every table.

### MAY STAGE CARNIVAL

The Eagles may enter the carnival field. The question is being discussed by the lodge members and action will probably be taken within a short time. ### HOLD-UP MEN SECURE \$51 FROM AGED NEGRO

#### Man Named Vaughn is Freed of His Coin While Waiting For Street Car at Madison and Hill.

Hold up men working on the east side succeeded in securing \$51 from an aged Negro named Vaughn, about 7:30 o'clock last night. According to the story told by Vaughn he was waiting for a street car at the corner of Madison and Hill streets and took a seat on the curb.

While seated there, he says a couple of men came along and sat down beside him, each man sitting down a few feet away from him. Suddenly one of them struck him over the head and reaching in his pocket pulled out his purse and ran off with it.

This is the second hold up in the last few days according to residents of the east side. A couple of nights ago a resident of that section was walking on E. Lasalle av., when he was robbed of \$7.

### JUDGE FUNK REFUSES TO REMOVE ADMINISTRATOR

#### Holds There is a Lack of Evidence to Prove Charges Made by Heirs.

Judge Funk Wednesday refused to grant the petition of the heirs of the late Frank Gadacz to remove Atty. W. Alex. Grzesk as administrator of the will, on the grounds that he was fulfilling the duties the court had imposed on him. According to the complaint of the heirs, Atty. Grzesk failed to file an inventory of the estate and told some of the heirs that he did not care if some of the children went to the Orphans' home, as he was looking after the interests of the wife of the late Frank Gadacz.

The petition was refused on the grounds that there was a lack of evidence.

### SEATTLE TO ENTERTAIN SHRINERS NEXT YEAR

#### San Francisco Loses Honor in Battle of Western Cities at Atlanta.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 14.—After one of the sharpest fights in the history of the Mystic Shrine, Seattle, Wash., was granted over San Francisco the honor of entertaining the nobles in 1915. The committee on time and place unanimously favored Seattle but the California temples carried the fight to the floor of the convention.

Motley Flint, past potentate of Al Malakiah, Los Angeles, and George Filmer, potentate of Islam, San Francisco, were the leaders of the San Francisco contingent in the fight. Opposing them was the eloquence of Dr. Mark A. Mathews of Seattle, one of the leading Presbyterian clergymen of America.

### FLAMES ARE POURING FROM MOUNT ETNA

CATANIA, May 14.—The eruption of Mount Etna is becoming more threatening. Flames issued from the crater Wednesday accompanied by heavy volumes of smoke and continuous rumbling with frequently recurring earthquake shocks. The population of the surrounding villages have become panic-stricken and fled from their dwellings to camp in the tents provided for their shelter by the military authorities.

Prof. Platini of the Catania Volcanological institute, says an eruption of unprecedented violence may be expected at any moment.

Stores and factories will be closed during the funeral. Matinees in local theaters have been canceled and the scheduled Southern Michigan baseball league baseball game postponed.


### JEWELERS WILL MEET
