

CAROLINE COE'S FAMOUS RECIPES

SPANISH STEAK.

Pound one-half cup of flour with a half teaspoon of salt into an inch thick, medium sized round steak. Slice one onion, seed and chop two green peppers, one clove of garlic, cut in three pieces, peel and slice six large tomatoes. Put into skillet with two tablespoons of butter. Allow to cook slowly until it forms thick sauce. Turn sauce into bowl. Put two tablespoons of butter into skillet. Heat hot. Put in steak. Turn several times to sear. When steak is brown add sauce. Cover and simmer forty minutes. Do not allow the sauce to cook brown; add a little stock or water as needed. Serve steak and sauce in center of platter with border of cooked rice with dash of curry powder.

CHILI, CHICKEN AND RICE.

Joint two chickens, boil in three quarts of water, with salt to taste until very tender. There should be two quarts of stock left. Take out one pint. Boil three pints and drop in two-thirds cup of rice. Boil ten minutes and add three chopped chilies that have been put in oven until skin can be removed. Boil ten minutes longer. Stir into rice and chill two tablespoons of butter. Put layer of one-third rice in bottom of shallow pan, then layer of half-boned chicken. Alternate rice and chicken, having rice on top. Beat the yolks of three eggs into the pint of cool broth, pour over rice, sprinkle with few bread crumbs, and bits of butter. Set in oven to brown. Serve very hot.

BEEETS.

Wash carefully. Twist the tops from the roots. Do not peel or break the skin, as the juice will then escape and both the color and flavor will be lost. Beets are very wholesome and nutritious, containing large amounts of starch, sugar and alkaline salts.

BEEETS AND BEET GREENS.

Twist tops from the roots. Wash roots in clear cold water. Wash roots and put over in hot water. Boil until tender. Drop into cold water and the skin will slip off easily. Put tops into kettle with hot water, just enough to cover them. If very young they should be done in twenty minutes. If older it will take longer. Salt to taste. When cooked put greens in colander and chop lightly with knife. When medium fine, put greens in center of dish they may be served in. Chop beet roots, place row round greens, dot all with butter, put in moderate oven ten minutes and serve. A little chopped, cooked bacon may be added to greens.
