PEANUT BUTTER. Roast two pounds of raw peanuts until the meats are delicate brown. Remove shell and all skin and grind in food grinder...

POUND CAKE. Cream one pound of butter with one pound of sugar, one pound of eggs. Beat yolks of eggs until lemon color, add to butter and sugar...

BAKED BANANAS. Remove peel from ten bananas, scrape off all coarse threads, melt two tablespoons of butter in agate pan. Roll bananas in little sugar and place in butter in the pan...

Women of the National American Woman Suffrage association are jubilant.

They have, at last, persuaded congress to appoint committees to meet them officially.

Saturday, June 27, Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, president of the national organization, Jane Addams, first vice president, and Mrs. Desha Breckenridge, second vice president, with Mrs. Medill McCormick, chairman of the congressional committee of the national organization, will meet a

committee from the senate and the house at Washington.

These committees were named, respectively, by Vice Pres. Marshall and Speaker Clark, through the good offices of the congressional committee.

The four leading suffragists will carry with them and present the petitions asking for a federal amendment giving the right to vote to all women in the United States.

These petitions were signed, May 2, the day simultaneous suffrage demonstrations were held in each state of the union.

DR. THOMPSON'S EYE TALKS

What are Torics? In some of my recent talks I have said a good deal in favor of "toric" lenses. Some of my customers have said that they do not understand what toric lenses are. I want to explain.

The ordinary lenses that have been in use for the past fifty years are flat or nearly so. The new toric lenses are not flat but are bent, like the bowl of a spoon.

There is a deep hollow, or concave surface, on the side next to the eye, and a corresponding convex surface on the other side. With this deep hollow surface toward the eye the lenses can be brought much closer to the eye without striking the lashes.

It brings the edges of the lenses farther back so that you do not see them so plainly. You can turn your eyes farther to one side and still look out squarely through the lenses because the curve of the lens corresponds to the rotation of your eye.

You can turn your eyes more freely to look at objects to the right or left instead of turning your whole head as in the case of flat lenses. So far as the focus of the lens and its strength are concerned they are the same. In other words a lens to fit a certain eye can be made either in the flat form or the toric and be perfectly accurate in both cases, but there is no question about the torics being much more practical and convenient.
