Science Trails The Cockroach

Some Ways to Get Rid Of Disease Bearer as Dangerous as The Fly

BY CAROLINA COE. Cockroaches carry disease. They are almost as dangerous as the house fly, to which medical research has traced the spread of germ diseases and through a campaign of publicity has educated the public to wage merciless war upon.

Now science is camping upon the trail of the roach, having pronounced it a death-dealing agent. "Ware the cockroach! Kill him at sight. He is a menace to your life and the lives of your children.

Evidence as to roaches spreading other diseases is less direct, but there is no doubt they play an important part in the dissemination of diphtheria, tonsillitis, and tuberculosis, carrying the organisms on their feet and in their intestinal canals.

Cockroaches overrun kitchens pantries, garbage heaps and decaying matter, picking up particles with their feet, or feelers, and dropping them later in another place. When hundreds and thousands of cockroaches do this, the amount of matter they carry from place to place is larger than the average housewife considers possible.

Flourid of sodium will exterminate the cockroach. It is a dry, white powder, employed medicinally in doses of one grain. It is stated that a dose of 100 grains is fatal to human beings.

As an experiment a test was made with sodium flourid and it completely freed a ship of roaches. But 36 pounds of the powder was used, as against 400 pounds of the exterminator which did not exterminate.

Sodium flourid costs 15 cents a pound and can be bought from your druggist. It should be so distributed that the roaches will walk in it. A small quantity adheres to their feet or antennae and the insect cleanses them with its mouth.

The powder, placed about in small heaps, has no value. It should be spread in thin layers in runways where it will remain dry and powdery. With a blower it should be forced into cracks, pipe holes, spaces behind moulding, pantry shelves, cupboards and wherever cockroaches are noticed traveling about.

A whisk broom will be found adaptable when spreading the powder over shelves and in drawers. In small quantities the powder is not dangerous, although when it is used in pantries it is always best to scald dishes and pans before using them to wash off any particles of the powder which might make one sick.

Caroline Coe's Famous Recipes

SAVORY CHEESE.

Rub one-quarter pound of Roquefort cheese to smooth paste. Add two tablespoons of sweet cream, fifteen drops of onion juice, add one cream cheese (costs 10 cents), mix all together with silver fork.

SALAD DRESSINGS.

Cut clove of garlic, rub the bowl on all sides with each piece. Put one teaspoon of salt, one-half teaspoon of black pepper, a dash of paprika and a tablespoon of tomato catsup, blend all together. Add seven tablespoons of oil a little at a time. When all oil is used add two tablespoons of strong vinegar. Have all ingredients ice cold.

French dressing may be made in a glass vinegar cruet, and kept on the table. Use seven tablespoons of oil and three tablespoons of vinegar, one-half teaspoon of salt, a dash of paprika. Put all in bottle, shake until it is well blended, put one red pepper-corn and one small piece of garlic into cruet, add other ingredients, put in stopper and shake until all is blended.
