BENDERS LOSE BY POOR LUCK BREAK

Although Williams Pitches Four Hit Game Crickets Get in Three Runs When Ball Takes Bad Bounce Passing Border.


SAGINAW WINS ANOTHER

TROUBLE IS AGAIN FACING BASEBALL

Near Riot at Washington—Detroit Game May Result in Another Strike Order By Members of Fraternity.

DETROIT, Aug. 1.—Trouble as serious as that threatened when the Kraft strike case was menacing is now promised organized baseball as a result of the near riot that marked the Thursday game in this city. It is expected that the Baseball Players' Fraternity will get into the melee following the suspension of Players Morgan and Abmsmith, of the Washington team. Both of these men are out incidentally. Manager Griffith of the Nationals and the players who are members of the Fraternity, claim that Empire Sheridan also should be disciplined. If Player Morgan is to be forced to idle, John Henry, a catcher, is a member of the Fraternity's advisory board which is responsible for the recent strike order. He also was banished by a chair thrown from a box during the night.

He is somewhat worked up over the recent trouble and says that it did not end with the inquiry made by Pres. Johnson yesterday. A report on this matter will be made to headquarters, said Henry this morning. "What action will be taken I do not know. The players are not denying that punishment should be administered to Abmsmith, and Morgan for their part in Thursday's affair, but they do claim that it is entirely unfair to put Morgan out of the game and to allow Empire Sheridan, who started the trouble by hitting Morgan, to go unpunished."

BABY DEMON II IS FASTEST MOTOR BOAT

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Aug. 1.—Baby Demon II, winner in Friday afternoon's event in the motor boat races on Lake George for the championship of North America, was awarded the cup, having a total of 29 points.
