BELGIANS FORCED BACK TO ANTWERP

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) within the outer ring of the Antwerp forts.

Extensive engagement Opens. "The sortie, which at first seemed to be merely a skirmish operating against covering troops, left by the enemy in front of Antwerp, developed into an action on an extensive scale."

"The result attained is of capital importance from the point of view of the allies' staffs, since, in consequence of our intervention two German army corps have been unable to go to the assistance of the German armies that are retreating in France."

"In view of the concentration of all the German forces available in this vicinity our army found itself after the fourth day in the presence of superior numbers, whereupon it returned to Antwerp."
