

NEW YORK.—"Out of the mouths of babes" comes a protest against the war in Europe. Children of America will send a monster petition to the rulers of the nine warring nations asking them to stop the slaughter that is making thousands of children orphans.

Mrs. Mary Ware Dennett is one of several prominent women who are directing the Children's Peace Movement.
