

COMPLETE PLANS FOR BIG PARADE

Expected That Thousand Machines Will Be in Line on Night of Oct. 31.—Nearby Cities Invited to Join.

Practically all arrangements for the Halloween celebration of the Lincoln Highway association which will be held on the night of Oct. 31 by South Bend and Mishawaka members of the organization, were completed at a meeting held at the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday night.

The members of the association and other autoists of South Bend and Mishawaka will meet at Springbrook park, which will be the starting point for the parade. The route has been planned so as to include both cities.

Members of the committee urge that the association members and highway boosters decorate their automobiles for the occasion. No definite style of decoration is urged except that Lincoln highway banners be displayed as much as possible.

The line of the parade as decided upon by the committee at the meeting held Wednesday night provides that the automobiles line up on the north side of Lincoln highway at Springbrook park. The parade will then proceed to Wayne st., west on Wayne st. to Main st., north on Main st. to Elsie ave., west on Elsie ave. to Lafayette ave., north on Lafayette ave. to Wayne st., east on Wayne st. to Vista ave., then to Main st., Mishawaka, south on Main st. to First st., two blocks east on First and then north to Second st., and return on the Lincoln highway to Springbrook park.

Marshals for the parade were selected as follows: Samuel Leeper, Fred Dennis, D. G. Wolfe, N. J. Riley, Edgar France, M. L. Williams and J. C. Ellsworth of South Bend and Kenyon Mix, George Clark, Stanley McIntosh and A. D. Warner.

An invitation is extended by the association to all towns on the vicinity to participate in the celebration on Halloween night. This invitation includes New Carlisle, Walkerton, North Liberty, Lakeville, Niles, Osceola and other nearby towns.
