WOMAN'S MOVEMENT BUILDS CHARACTER

Rabbi Cronbach Addresses the
Civics Department of Women's Club—All Men Are Equal.

An address by Rabbi Cronbach of South Bend featured the well attended meeting of the Civics department of the Mishawaka Woman's club Thursday afternoon in the entertainment parlors of the Methodist Memorial church. The meeting opened with reports of various committees, which were scheduled for the previous meeting, but owing to several of the members of the committee being out of the city at that time, it was postponed. Judge Pieg was to have been the speaker Thursday afternoon, but was unable to be present.

Rabbi Cronbach said in part: "A 130 years ago the controversy raged about the equality of man. It took a long period of hard fighting to bring it out that all men are equal. What they meant was not that all men are equal in the sense that two and two are equal to four. What they really meant was that all men are careful, all men are valuable, all men are good for something.

"As surely as life in many sided so surely are all men useful, valuable, important. There is so much to life and such variety that if you are not useful, valuable, important for one purpose, there are many other purposes for which you can be useful, valuable, important.

"Women are the equals of men because they are useful, valuable, important. Women can do everything that men can do and a few things that men cannot do. When it comes to the heroism and saintliness of motherhood, men are not in it. A man is a hero on rare and exceptional occasions. Every mother is a hero. Rarely is there anything in the life of the average man that equals the heroism of maternity.
