

SOUTH BENDERS GO TO CLAIM BODY OF FRED JACKSON OF WARSAW FOUND DEAD UNDER CHARRED RUINS OF BORROWED AUTO.

Roy Hill of This City and Mrs. Fred Jackson of Warsaw Found Dead Under Charred Ruins of Borrowed Auto.

Roy Hill, formerly of 1251 W. Washington av. and Mrs. Fred Jackson of Warsaw were instantly killed Sunday morning when an automobile turned turtle with them and buried them under its weight. Fire catching from the machine's engine, burned the car and charred their bodies until they were almost past recognition. Hill was 27 years old and had gained some fame in this city and in northern Indiana as a daring motorcycle driver. His wife, Mrs. Verie Hill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bert A. Mead, 1251 W. Washington av., was called to Warsaw immediately upon the finding of the bodies and their identification. Mr. and Mrs. Mead accompanied her.

After identification by Stephen Hill, father of the victim, and Fred Jackson, husband of the woman, the bodies were removed to a Leebur-undertaking establishment. It was not yet decided whether the body of Hill will be brought to South Bend for burial or not.

Hill is thought to have been killed instantly when the machine hit the loose gravel and went into the ditch. His body was under the machine but the bruises on his head and his face

were of such a nature to lead to the conclusion that the weight of the machine crushed out his life.

Woman Burns to Death. Apparently the woman was forced to remain under the machine, realizing full well that her death was coming slowly and surely unless aid reached her in short time. About half of her body was covered by the machine. In front could be seen marks in the earth where in her desperate attempts to throw the machine off her body, she had literally torn up the earth.

The clothing was completely burned and both bodies were charred by the flames. It was impossible to recognize either of the two. It is thought possibly that the woman's death might have resulted from suffocation or that she might have lost consciousness before the flames reached her.

Borrowed Automobile. Saturday night Hill went to J. Hopkins his brother-in-law and requested to borrow his automobile. He stated that he wanted it only a few minutes and promised to return it to the garage in short order. He was allowed to take it and the machine was not seen any more by the owner until Sunday morning shortly after 9 o'clock when the accident was reported to the police in this city.

Dick Marvel, a farmer, who lives about 40 rods from the scene of the accident, discovered the bodies about 3 o'clock Sunday morning. He stated that at about 1 o'clock he noticed a fire along side the roadway but that he paid no attention to it. He said he remembered it was Halloween night and thought that some celebrators had built a fire there as a sort of Halloween prank.

About 9 o'clock he decided to investigate and on reaching the spot saw the charred automobile. A further search showed the bodies of the man and woman. He sent to Warsaw for help. The bodies were removed and taken to an undertaking establishment at Leesbur.

Father Views Body. Steven Hill, the dead man's father, was notified and viewed the body. He said that it was his son. The automobile was a further aid in the identification.

Hill and the woman apparently had been riding around for several hours before they were thrown from the machine. They were going north, away from Warsaw at the time. It is thought that the speed of the car carried it into the ditch and that before landing it overturned and came down on the occupants.

Hill was one of the best known motorcycle riders in northern Indiana. He had lived in South Bend at various times and is well known there. Mrs. Jackson had been married only a short time. She is supposed to have met Hill down town Saturday night and left with him on what proved to be their fatal trip.

Fire is supposed to have been started by an explosion of the gasoline tank. All the wood work and the leather furnishings on the car were burned. When found the steel frame remained and this was piled on top of the two victims.
