During the recent campaign republican and progressive orators never missed an opportunity to place before the public the splendid example of our federal workingman's compensation act

More lately it has leaked out what the federal compensation act really amounts to.

Judging from the compensation paid to injured workmen and the families of those killed, Uncle Sam is about the meanest employer in the whole business world.

The law was passed some five years ago covering artisans and laborers in manufacturing establishments, arsenals and navy yards, river and harbor, fortification work, and hazardous employment in the reclamation service

Since the passage of the act almost every state in the union has provided laws on the subject of workmen's compensation. Judging by the amounts paid to injured workmen under the federal law, Uncle Sam is less generous than any of the states and is a poor model for employers.

While this statement will no doubt be pleasing to many who have felt that the estimates that have been published were misleading or unfair it is pointed out that the figures at best show the existence of all too many habitual users of narcotic drugs

COCAINE AND NARCOTICS. The United States public health service calls attention in the health reports of this week to the need of further control of the sale and use of habit-forming drugs.

Practically every state in this country has a reasonably efficient anti-narcotic law. However, even the best of these laws are practically inoperative because of the continued and apparently uncontrollable importation of such drugs from other states.

It is generally admitted that much of the traffic in habit-forming drugs is carried on by illegitimate dealers. These dealers, however, secure their supplies through legitimate channels and it is this leak which needs to be located and suppressed.

Up to the present time the estimates regarding the number of drug addicts in this country have not been based on reliable data and have usually been far in excess of the actual number that could be supplied with the drugs really available.


