SAYS GOD'S HATRED IS OF SIN, NOT OF SINNER
Preacher Discusses Divine Attitude Toward Transgressors in Sermon at Hope Chapel.

The sermon at Hope Presbyterian chapel last night by Rev. G. W. Allison was an attempt to determine how God must necessarily regard sin and the person of the sinner.

"We need not be told what sin is—it is too sadly familiar to us. We all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." We have been spotted of the world. Some of the words used commonly in the Bible to designate sin mean "missing the mark," and associated with this is the expectation that the sinner has turned his back upon God and is driving his own life with the reins in his teeth, self-assertive against God. Irrespective of his will and love. Sin is first of all opposed to righteousness of life, integrity and frankness of character, to sincerity and uprightness,—to the best that is in us and in the world. Iniquity is another word used to describe sin. This means a twisted, perverted, distorted, crooked, turned-aside, diverted from the way, life.

"Remembering that 'all have sinned'—sin brings upon the sinner guilt, inescapable blameworthiness. In this condition we stand for 'All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one into his own way.' Let us note the end of this way of life. 'The wages of sin is death.' Were this the end—we had rather probably not been born and should be of all men most miserable. But it is only half. We are not left hopeless. For 'God hath not dealt with us after our sins nor rewarded us according to our iniquities.' He loved and still loves His children and hates the things of sin they do. As a token of the sincerity and depth of passion from which this love sprang, He sent to the cross his only begotten son. He loved us first. Will we appreciate His love deeply enough to repent of our sins, turn from them in sorrow, and look toward the light which is life?"

These services will continue for two weeks each evening except Saturday, with preaching every night by either Mr. Allison or Mr. Ormond. Friday night there will be a special sermon for young people.
