Cohan's mystery farce, "Seven Keys to Baldpate." The mere fact that "Seven Keys to Baldpate" is the work of George M. Cohan makes it a magnet. Those who come to the Oliver opera house tomorrow night today for a lively night won't leave excitement hungry, for the play is loaded with excruciatingly funny situations sudden shifts of plot and unlooked for complications. Buckley's animals are clever and the dogs, monkeys, baboons and bears make a complete animal show of particular interest to the children.

AT THE LASALLE.

Dr. McCuaig Will Open Series of Addresses Sunday Morning at First Presbyterian Church.

When Dr. McCuaig speaks to the women in the First Presbyterian church tomorrow afternoon, he will lay the foundation for all of the lectures to women that will be given during the next three weeks, so it is essential that every woman should avail herself of this opportunity to get this teaching from the beginning.

Boys under the age of 16 years will not be admitted to the special lectures for either men or women, but they will be welcome at all other lectures or addresses.
