Rev. Dr. Edwards Preaches Last of Sermons in Connection With the Evangelistic Series.

The series of evangelical services which have been in progress at the Methodist Memorial church for the past two weeks and which have aroused much interest in the community, were brought to a close Sunday evening.

His Sunday afternoon address to men was a brilliant peroration. Speaking from the text, "Manhood Weighed in the Balance," he gave a vivid description of a great and gorgeous banquet hall, a magnificent palace of a Babylonian king, one of the wonders of the ancient world.

Illustrating his text the speaker asked if manhood in Mishawaka was measuring up; was it making good; would it pass muster?

Manhood weighed in the balance of truth, and he, the speaker, wondered if men appreciated what high and noble qualities were bound up in the element in character which we call truth.

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NEWS OF INTEREST TO POLISH CITIZENS

Polish citizens on Sunday evening celebrated the 83d anniversary of the insurrection in their native land, known in Polish history as the November insurrection.

More than 400 people assembled at the St. Hedwige hall and about 500 at St. Stanislaus hall, where the principal celebrations were held under the auspices of St. John's Cantus Literary society of St. Hedwige's parish, and under the direction of the Young People's society of St. Stanislaus church.

The hall decorations consisted of bunting and flags in the national colors.
