JUNIOR STUDENTS GIVE FOOD FOR DAYS RATHER THAN ONE BIG FEAST

Girls Figure Carefully on Nutrition Values of Staple Articles for the Needy.
Extravagance was tabooed in the preparation of some 20 baskets which the junior class of the South Bend high school will deliver to as many poor families on Christmas eve. The baskets were filled by the girls of the junior domestic science classes, who figured out carefully the best food values for the money spent and provided that which would supply not just the most enjoyment but the most nourishment and warmth and energy.
There will be no turkeys in these baskets but instead staple supplies which will provide meals for many days rather than a feast for one day followed by famine. The average cost of the baskets was \$1.78. There was some variation in this in the individual cases, owing to the fact that the number of persons in each family provided for was learned and the provisions apportioned accordingly.
Beans, cornmeal, flour, rice, potatoes, oatmeal, sugar and lard were

among the supplies put in each. The only fruits or sweets were apples, popcorn balls and gingerbread cookies. The popcorn balls and cookies were, of course, made by the girls of the domestic science classes. A few toys will be added to each gift before it is delivered.
The money for the baskets was raised by subscription among the juniors and the sum collected amounted to \$55. The deliveries will be made on Christmas eve by the boys of the junior class.


