### American Woman Is Serving Soldiers

Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney Providing Funds For Neutral Hospital.

In the "About People" department of the March Woman's Home Companion appears a short article about Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney of New York and the American ambulance hospital in Paris. An extract follows: "Shortly after the war began, American residents in Paris established in a government building in the suburb of Neuilly the American ambulance, more familiarly known as the Ambulance Hospital—as ambulance in French means a military hospital—which holds the record for efficient service. The hospital building was remodeled by Carroll Greenough, an American architect. The head of the hospital, Dr. Winchester Doudouche, and the entire medical, surgical and nursing staff are Americans. Even the orderlies and the chauffeurs who run the donated American motor ambulances are young Americans.

### WANTS \$25,000 FOR ALLEGED INJURIES

Cleo Spicer, by Her Next Friend, Marie Kaminski, Brings Action Against Street Car Co.

Suit for \$25,000 damages for alleged personal injuries has been brought in the superior court against the Chicago, South Bend & Northern Indiana Railroad Co. by Marie Kaminski for Cleo Spicer, 14 years old. It is alleged that Cleo, a high school girl, suffered permanent injuries when she slipped and fell on the icy floor of a street car. The plaintiff is represented by P. C. Ferguson.

The allegations are that the accident occurred when the girl started to alight from a Michigan av. car at Sherman av. on Jan. 15. It is charged that the conductor of the car negligently permitted snow and ice to accumulate on the floor of the car with the result that the plaintiff was unable to stand when the car made a sudden start. It is said that in the fall she struck her back on an iron which projected above the floor in the doorway. The plaintiff alleges that as a result of the fall her nervous system was injured and she suffered internal injuries.

### CITY IS HOST TO MANY

Fifty-six Registered at Higgins Flop Thursday Night.

The "Higgins Flop" at the city hall is doing a rushing business these days. In fact it keeps an officer busy practically all night up until 1 or 2 o'clock registering the visitors who arrived in squads and companies. ### PHARISAIISMS SUBJECT OF DR. C. A. LIPPINCOTT

Covetousness, Greed, Conceit and Jealousy Are Greatest Evils of Present Day.

"The people of today condemn licentiousness, drunkenness and dishonesty, believing they are the greatest evils, while in fact covetousness, greed, conceit and jealousy are the greatest evils that confront the individuals of the present day," said Dr. C. A. Lippincott, in his talk last night at the regular meeting of the Young Men's Bible class held in the lobby of the Y. M. C. A. on the subject "Pharisaism."

He spoke of the selfishness of the Pharisees, saying that they gave one-third of their earnings to the work of Christ but they gave it in a way that it helped themselves more than Christ. What they believed was virtue was really vice.

Lieut. Phillip Remington, inspector-instructor of the regular army from Indianapolis, gave Co.
