Further Arrangements For Parade to Be Held Saturday Afternoon Are Announced.

Further arrangements for the automobile parade to be held Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock as the grand finale of Fashion week were announced yesterday afternoon by R. S. Newman, advertising manager of The News-Times, who is in charge of the general plans. Lafayette st., between Washington and Jefferson the cars will move south to South st., then east to Michigan st., north to the German Turner hall and counter-march on Michigan to Wayne st., then west to Main and north to Colfax where the procession disbands.

### LIQUOR WAS PAID FOR AT THE SALOON BAR

Samuel Klopfer, Restaurant Proprietor, Freed on Blind Tiger Charge.

Samuel Klopfer, a restaurant keeper at 503 S. Scott st., was found not guilty in city court yesterday afternoon on a charge of operating a blind tiger. His wife, John Mandisch, a saloonkeeper at S. Scott and Ford sts., and the defendant were put on the stand by Klopfer's attorneys.

It was held that he had sold beer and Hungarian tea—a mixture of the regulation leaf with rum—which had been stored in his kitchen. Julius Musick, another Scott st. saloon man, was chief state witness. He declared that for two hours he and companions had stayed in the Klopfer room and that he had paid for liquors after they had been served.

Klopfer was found not guilty on the statute which states that liquor bought in a licensed saloon may be consumed at any other place. Mrs. Klopfer, who was married to Klopfer Wednesday, declared that she had taken the money from Musick and to have paid for the liquor at the bar.

### REPORTS SHOW PROGRESS

Sunday Schools Rooms Are to be Extended.

Reports read at the annual congregational meeting of Hope Presbyterian chapel showed that the past year has been one of great progress in all of the departments of the church. The report of the Bible school was particularly encouraging, as it showed that the school grew during the year beyond the capacity of the present building, making larger equipment necessary.
