

MUST NOT LOSE FAITH IN LORD

Value of Suffering as Benefit to Others is Lesson Drawn By Rev. C. A. Decker From Christ's Crucifixion.

The value of suffering for the benefit of others, in the same way that Jesus suffered on the cross, was emphasized by Rev. Charles A. Decker in his Sunday morning sermon at the First Baptist church.

"What is the explanation," he asked, "of the cry of Jesus, 'My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me?' We must reply that we do not know. It would relieve the matter of all difficulty if we could look upon Jesus as a mere man, but this we cannot do.

"The value of suffering for the benefit of others, in the same way that Jesus suffered on the cross, was emphasized by Rev. Charles A. Decker in his Sunday morning sermon at the First Baptist church.

"There are three practical lessons that are to be derived from this experience of Jesus. First, that the time of suffering is not the time to release one's hold on God. Though he does not understand the meaning of all this, he still cries, 'My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me?'

"Contrast with that the triumph of the Christ in the story of today. How that after a ministry of healing of the body, mind and soul among His beloved people, after suffering many injustices already from the supposedly religious of the times; he then comes to the holy city of Jerusalem, and seated on the lowly animal of service, enters the city while the streets surge with people and the walls of the city echo with 'Hosanna to the Son of David! Hosanna in the Highest!'

"In the triumph of Christ there is an undercurrent, if not a threatening dissonance. It is plain to be seen that the hand of God was in some way back of the entire situation; and that that which was, was for the best.
