## Flaring Petticoats Return to Favor

Taffeta Skirts Are Ruffled and Bound to Hold Them Out; Colors Are Bright.

Petticoats return to style. Taffeta underskirts with five holed tops and with 12-inch circular ruffles at their hems have a hemmed or fringed ruffling at the top and bottom of the ruffle that helps hold it out. They come in bright colors—red, cherry, king's blue, violet, etc. Both striped Roman silk and the black and white Pekin stripes make pretty silk or satin petticoats. These are made with two-gored tops and a 12 or 20-inch ruffle. The striped underskirt has a top and lower edge frill of double box pleated tulle. A black and white skirt has a fringed ruche, rather heavy, of the material. Another taffeta underskirt of very soft silk has two ruffles of the material, one longer than the other. The lower edges are cut into deep scallops and overlapped with a bias fold of the silk. All this ruffling and overlapping is to hold the skirt out from the feet so as to add to the flare of the skirt.

An unusual variety in footwear is without doubt caused by the shortness of the fashionable dress skirts. Boots remain in style and will be worn more or less throughout the summer. Where we had light topped boots last season as a novelty we now have a light boot of highly glazed kid. This comes in champagne, battle gray and other neutral tones that look well with any type of dress. Sometimes, as in the white boots, the tips, heels and buttons are black. The all light boot has matching buttons or inside or front lacing match the color of the kid exactly. In some of the lace boots the lacing is put in horizontally and the metal eyelets show only from the wrong side. In the two-tone boots the tips, heels and back vamp are of patent leather.

Other Fashion Hints. Low shoes are more slipper than shoe shaped. A few models lace up the side, as in the high boots, but most of the low shoes seem to be cut on the slipper plan—rather high and pointed in front, so that a gaiter would fit smoothly over them.

Veils are veritable colobes. For those who like a very fine veil there are the new square and hexagonal meshes that have the appearance of a hair net.

Veils with these same fine meshes have all over designs, considerably spaced, of black velvet diamonds or squares, both solid and hollow. They give the impression of little beauty patches scattered over the face at a little distance where the veil mesh does not show. In another style of this veiling a running straggly design which looks like a wandering basting thread takes little unexpected twists and turns that shape into leaves and flowers seemingly drawn by a child's hand.

Wide borders of this kind are placed on the lower part of veils of the floating type. Sometimes the leaves and flowers are filled in with a sort of darning stitch.

Many of the waists have a high collar that opens in front, and an empiacement that forms a round yoke and descends into a wide front panel decorated by flower clusters of hand embroidery.

Lapels are also seen in the imported models—large soft ones that drape across into surplice fronts and are decorated with hand embroidery in the corners. A rather wide beading, a shade off the white, is seen in some blouses.

Lace blouses have a bolero oversleeve of lace and touches of colored satin in the vest or girdle. The collars are high in the back, but descend into an open V front. Silk blouses often mimic the cord knits. Those on tailored lines make a great deal of their fancy buttons, which follow right up to the military collar.

## ALLEGED FORGER FACES SECOND SERIOUS CHARGE

Clarence Sterling Brought Back from Milwaukee When Davies Shirt Co. Claims Embezzlement.

He was alleged to have operated under several aliases, among them Frank G. Horton and George H. Horton. The Davies offense was said to have occurred about March 15. He was brought back from Milwaukee to face this last charge.

Patrolman Rudynski Sets Mark of 50—Squad Gets 302 for High.

The first perfect score at the daily target practice of the police department was noted Wednesday afternoon when Patrolman Rudynski hit the targets with every one of 12 shots. He registered a score of 50. Rudynski is a member of Sgt. Stickle's shooting squad, which Wednesday set the year's record with a score of 302 points out of a possible 600. In the three weeks' shooting Detective Wolters has scored a total of 127 points out of a possible 150, while Rudynski is second with 125.
