

Hoosiers Leave Tuesday To Play Dozen Games While On First Road Trip

HOOSIERS TAKE FOUR STRAIGHT IN GOOD START

Second Contest With Wheeler Outfit Grabbed by Smithies After Vehics Had Taken Two Run Lead.

The scrappy Hoosiers went out and took their fourth straight game of the season Sunday afternoon by wallowing the Wheeler Venues after the visitors had secured a two run lead in the early innings. The final count was 5 and 2, the Smithies clouting their way to victory and assisted by some shabby fielding on the part of the Wheeler band.

The Wheeler gang played an erratic game. Six boots were marked up against them. The Hoosiers did much heavy hitting, Scott being bombarded for a quartet of doubles and five additional singles. Herbert Hill was not spectacular in his twirling for the Smithies.

Although it was cool at the park and rain threatened to break up the game at different times, a crowd of 1,500 fans braved the weather to see the Hoosiers in action. This afternoon the final game of the first home series will be staged with the Wheeler club and then the Hoosiers will leave on a 12 day road trip which will take them to four towns in the circuit, Jackson, Bay City, Saginaw and Flint.

As an opener the Vehics shoved over a run. Kerman singled to left and was sacrificed to second by Pahlman. He went to third on Hunsress' roller to Beall and scored when Huffman singled over second. Nifnecker died, Clafey to Beall. Broder got to first on Wheeler's hot but was forced out by Eschen. Jimmy was caught pilfering and Grodick's crash to Kerman was fruitless.

Hill settled in the second although Wells got a single to left. The Hoosiers were unhandled in the "Squirrel" Scott's underhand afloat. In the third our Herbert wavered. He passed Kerman and Pahlman sacrificed once more. Hunsress sent Kerman across the plate with a single into center. Eschen was unable to get the Vehic at the rubber and Hunsress took second on the throw. He was forced at third when Huffman pushed one at Hill. Nifnecker pitched to Lake. George Beall started the Hoosiers' half of the third with a two bagger to the center field fence. Clafey added down a hunt and Pahlman started an spectacular play to third on Beall but the ball went through Kerman and George came all the way home. Clafey advanced to third on Hill's sacrifice and was given the plate. Broder worked Scott for a free ticket and stole second. Eschen also walked and Grodick singled over short but Huffman got Broder at the plate.

Hill in the fourth passed Bell and Grodick fumbled. Wheeler's slow grounder. Both Flint men advanced on Wells' infield out. Scott fouled out to Beall and Kerman far red. Helmer cast on when Nifnecker booted and then pilfered. Hixenbaugh hit to center. Lake went out, Pahlman unassisted. Beall walked and the bases were choked. Clafey cracked one just over the base. He took a bad hop, getting away from Bell, and went for a double, Helmer and Hixenbaugh scoring. Hill fanned and Broder popped up to Wheeler.

In the fifth Pahlman got a single to left and Beall featured by making a sensational catch of a foul tip from Hunsress. Helmer got a fence-busting double to right in this period. In the sixth Hill got a single to left but this was the extent of the damage to Hill. Lake started this round by an infield hit and took second on Kerman's bad throw. Beall sacrificed him to third but Clafey and Hill skied out.

In the seventh Hill started by passing Kerman, who took second on passed ball and to third on an infield out but there was no one to bring him across. The Hoosiers scored again in this round. Eschen dragged one down the third base line and beat it out. He pilfered second and marked when Beall got a single to left in the eighth but Nifnecker and Wells flied out while Hill took Wheeler at first base unassisted. Beall got another smashing double to center. Clafey went to Kerman to Pahlman. Hill shoved one at Kerman and the third sacker made the play on Beall. Thinking there were three out Kerman threw the ball into the air and Clafey never that umpire Stear had adjudged Beall safe. During the excitement, the Hoosier crossed the plate. It looked for a time that "Ho" was in for a trimming at the game was finally put into operation again. Kerman was up in the air and threw wild on Broder's grounder. Eschen was called out on strike.

It looked bad for Hill again in the ninth. McConnell went in as a pinch hitter for Scott but took three in a row. Hill passed Kerman. Pahlman followed with a short single to left. Both advanced on an infield out by Hunsress. Huffman, the hard hitting Vehic outfielder fanned.

FIRST BASEMAN IS HITTING PILL

George Beall Performing in Ty Cobb Style With Stick This Spring—Wants to Be in Elite .300 Crowd This Year.



George Beall, the crack Hoosier first baseman, gained popularity last season through his spectacular fielding, but fell down as a hitter.

"If 'Hal' could only hit," was the general expression of Ed Smith, the players and the fans as they watched the first sacker in action.

All winter Beall worked in a Chicago gymnasium, his one object being to remedy his falling with the stick, and from the start he has made in the five games thus far it appears that George will be one of the real clouters of the club.

His two doubles, a sacrifice and free pass in the Sunday fray were responsible for two of the tallies marked up by the Hoosiers.

In the five games since the opening of the season George has secured nine hits, four of them two baggers, in 19 trips to the rubber. This gives the first sacker a batting average of .474. Last season George hit .233 and his ambition is to strike around .300 this year.

George is also playing a spectacular fielding game again. He has made some brilliant stops at critical stages. He is one of the fighters of the club and his voice can always be heard in the heat of the fray as he encourages the man in the box and calls for "pepper" from his teammates.

KORFHAGEN OUT LOOSE BY SMITH

Infielder Is Released in Favor of Hixenbaugh—Hoosiers Start on 12-Day Road Trip to Four Towns Tonight.

Larry Korfhagen, 1914 Hoosier infielder and utility man, was released by Owner Ed Smith this afternoon on the eve of the opening of the first road series.

Korfhagen was one of the assets of the Hoosier crew last season with his pinch hitting, but Hixenbaugh has proved a better all-around man than Larry and Smith has decided to hold the Shelburn lad for at least a time.

Just what the outcome will be when Ben Koehler gets back into the game is not known. Hixenbaugh is a stellar third sacker and shows indication of being a good hitter. He is fast and a tenacious fighter, all of which things go to make up a good man for the club. But Steve Grodick, who is one of the best all-around infielders in the league, Joe played third last year. Joe Clafey is at short and has played a fair game.

There is a possibility that Grodick may be shifted to Clafey's place, but Smith does not want to let the Mishawaka go. He is in a dilemma of unusual proportions. Hixenbaugh is a better man than Clafey without a doubt, but the Hoosier owner cannot decide just what to do. It is probable that the puzzle will be worked out successfully on the road trip when a better opportunity will be afforded for getting a line on the men.

The Hoosiers will be away from the home lot for 12 days. They will leave tonight with the Flint club for the Vehic town where they will spend the night. They will open at Bay City Tuesday with the Colts for a three-day series. Then they will play three games in Saginaw, three in Flint and three in Jackson, returning home on May 16 with the Beavers for three days.

It is the hope of the Hoosiers to grab at least eight of the road games. Jimmy Eschen is demanding as much and says the Hoosiers must do it.
