

# Jackson Vets Will Be Victims of Hoosiers in a Three Day Fracas

## DUFFY'S HURLING PULLS HOOSIERS OUT OF BAD RUT

Ed Holds Flint to Two Safeties and One Run, Which Comes Across When a Double Play Fails.

FLINT, Mich., May 13.—"Unlucky" Duffy, the Hoosier right hander, broke the Koehler band's losing streak Wednesday by twirling one of the most masterful frays thus far in the 1915 Southern Michigan season. But two lonely swats were allowed the Wheeler tribe by the Bender cragman who himself contributed one-half of the quartet of runs marked by the Hoosiers. The final count was 4 to 1, with the Indiana troupe in the lead.

Although Duffy was selfish with his safeties he passed six of the Autos during the nine innings. But Rhoades surpassed the Hoosier in the liberalizing line, giving seven of the Koehler brigade tickets to the initial cushion. With these contributions bunched with six hits and a couple of boots by Rhoades, the Hoosiers shoved across four runs.

Hoosiers Score First. South Bend scored the first marker in the third. Broder's triple and Kothler's single did the work. In the fourth Duffy forced Hixenbaugh, who had been passed, and Duffy went to third when Edmiston fumbled Broder's single. Broder went to second, then Duffy and Broder pulled a double steal, Duffy counting. Koehler's sacrifice fly brought Broder across the plate.

In the ninth a pass to Duffy and a sacrifice and two boots by Rhoades gave the Hoosiers their fourth marker. The Autos scored their only run in the fifth when Wells and Bell were passed, and two attempts at double plays failed. Wells was allowed to cross the rubber on the second attempt.

## SIX MEN ARE TO REPRESENT HIGH AT STATE MEET

Affair Saturday Afternoon Will Be Biggest Ever Staged—Local Men Are Thought to Have Chance.

South Bend high school probably will send six men to the state high school track and field meet at Indianapolis Saturday afternoon according to information given out by Coach Metzler Wednesday night. These six men will be Kreuzberger, Scheibhut, Sweeney, Clybourne, Garfield and Scott. Smith and Heller were entered in the meet by Metzler, but he said Wednesday night that it was doubtful if these men would be taken along. It is likely that one of them at least may make the trip.

Kreuzberger will be the tan and blue entrant in the dashes, while Scheibhut may run these events also, but will be looked upon for points in the hurdle events. Garfield will run the quarter and the time he has been making in practice, gives hope for a place in this event. Scott has been working at the pole vault for the past two weeks and is taking the bar in great form. It would not surprise local fans to see him finish first or second. Sweeney and Clybourne will be the local entrants in the distance runs. Sweeney tackled Stoney northern Indiana mile record two weeks ago, and is expected to go even better this time, when the competition will be extraordinary strong. Clybourne has been clocked in fast time in trials at Notre Dame, in the half mile, and the little sophomore should pull a place in his favorite event.

## MONEY ABOUT RAISED

The debating club which is raising money to send the team, by the sale of shares of stocks, reports that it has taken in something like \$44.12 and as none of the business houses have been canvassed little trouble in raising the \$50 is anticipated. The meet this year will be the largest one yet held. More than 500 athletes have been entered in the different events and this makes the largest entry of any previous state meet. The greatest trouble that faces the men in charge of the meet is the limitation of the athletes, as it would be impossible for all entered to compete at the same time.

## MAY TIME RUNNERS

Another plan suggested for elimination in the quarter is the taking of the time of the winners in the trial heats and the man making the best time be declared the winner. This is hardly fair to the athlete, as he may not have strong competition, and a man always makes his best when pushed by an opponent. Indianapolis coaches who are in charge of the event favor the holding of elimination trials either Friday or Saturday morning but say they have no authority to make the arrangements this way, being under the domination of the state association. Some plan of elimination will have to be arranged as it would take all of Saturday morning and afternoon to stage the events, with such a large entry list.

## LORD WILL GET RELEASE

Former White Sox Third Baseman to Return to Game. CHICAGO, May 13.—Harry Lord, former third baseman of the Chicago White Sox, who deserted the team last August, will be given an unconditional release by Pres't Comiskey, so that he can join the Portland club of the New England League. Comiskey and Lord held a conference Monday and at its conclusion the player was told to go ahead with his negotiations with the eastern ball club and that if he came to terms his unconditional release would be signed. At the time he quit the White Sox Lord was a star infielder and captain of the team.

## Talks on Temperance

TEMPERANCE is being neglected in the battle now being waged between the "drys" and the "wets". The entire struggle has resolved itself into an attempt on the part of the prohibitionists to destroy the legitimate liquor trade and a quite natural resistance put up by the latter to prevent its own destruction. If state and local results have any significance at all, it is evident that, when the big battle is over, temperance will be little affected, no matter who be the victor.

Professional leaders of the prohibition movement have already made the admission that their purpose is not to stop the consumption of liquor by the individual. Their proposition, as embodied in the Hobson resolution, was merely to wipe out an industry which has sprung up in response to the individual demand for alcoholic beverages. The resolution said nothing against the manufacture of strong liquor by the individual for personal use. As one congressman declared, the Hobson resolution should have been entitled "An Act to Encourage the Manufacture of Intoxicating Drinks by Individuals". The Hobsonites, themselves, confessed that their measure would permit the manufacture of liquors for personal consumption.

Another representative, seeing the fallacy of the resolution, proposed to strike directly at the consumption of liquor by the individual, but the prohibition leaders refused to support him.

If prohibition does not propose to affect the individual by promoting temperance, and experience as well as its own admission proves that it does not, it has yet to announce its real object. If it would promote temperance let it explain why its methods have so far failed to reduce intemperate drinking in places where it has been given a trial.—Adv.
