

EXPECT 2,500 OUT ON BOOSTER DAY

Auto Parade Will Be One of the Features on June 30—Committee Will Conduct Sale of Tickets.

On Booster day, to be held here June 30, the seating capacity of Springbrook park will be severely taxed, according to the sentiment expressed at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce baseball committee held Friday afternoon.

Chairman David L. Guilfoyle announced the appointment of an automobile committee consisting of Carl Hibbard, C. N. Chubb, Gus Groeger, E. T. Bonds and John F. DeHaven and a band committee consisting of Joseph Werwinski, George F. Hull and Guy L. Staples.

One hundred autos will be in line in the big parade to be held just prior to the game, according to present plans. At least one, and possibly two of the local bands will be in the parade and will furnish music at the game.

The parade will traverse the downtown business district, and then will lead the crowd to the ball park. Special interest will be added to the game from the fact that Duke Holmes, pilot of the Saginaw team, was a member of the 1910 South Bend Central league team.

With so many minor leagues on the rocks in the country today South Bend may consider itself fortunate in having a club, particularly a club with the speed and of the brilliance of that which has been gathered together by Ed Smith and Ben Kochler this season.

In the letter which was sent out by Chairman Guilfoyle it was stated that a little work at this time the club could be placed upon a firm basis while waiting would endanger the life of the team and the league.

In other portions of Michigan towns the fans are responding liberally to the calls for the "Booster Days" which are held annually. Many women in Battle Creek and Flint are working with the men fans in selling tickets and it is probable that the women of South Bend will be called upon to assist in the ticket selling campaign.

MAKE CHANGES IN N. Y. CENTRAL SCHEDULES

Beginning on Sunday, May 6, Certain Trains Will Have Different Numbers and Time.

Beginning Sunday, June 6, changes will be made in the schedule of certain trains operating on the New York Central line. Train No. 20, east bound, at present leaving South Bend at 11:05 p. m., will be discontinued between Elkhart and Toledo and the number will be changed to 654.

Train No. 528, which runs only Sundays on the Grand Rapids branch, will be changed to No. 20, east bound, at present leaving South Bend at 11:05 p. m., arriving at Grand Rapids at 10:05 p. m.

Today a sleeping car was established on what was train No. 8, now 86, between Chicago and Buffalo. This car leaves South Bend at 9:55 p. m. bound for Cleveland, hence by train No. 20 over the eastern division to Buffalo arriving there at 9:40 a. m., central time, and 10:40 a. m., eastern time.

The following changes have been made in train numbers: No. 2, changed to No. 652; 7 to 87; 8 to 86; 20 to 654; 30 to 64; 34 to 90 and 45 to 85.

On the Indiana and Michigan division of the Lake Erie & Western train No. 23 leaving South Bend at 9:00 a. m. will be daily except on Sundays beginning tomorrow. On Sundays No. 27 will leave South Bend at 8:00 a. m. and arrive at Indianapolis at 12:01 noon.

HEAD OF BIG GO-CART CO. DIES IN NEW YORK

Charles A. Sidway Succumbs to Operation in New York—Estate Worth \$200,000.

ELKHART, Ind., June 5.—Charles A. Sidway, head of the Sidway Mercantile Co. of this city, the largest manufacturer of go-carts in the world, is dead following an illness due to pneumonia after an operation in the Roosevelt hospital in New York.

Mr. Sidway first became identified with Elkhart affairs in 1904. In November, that year, he and his uncle, Leverett S. Sidway, and the latter's son, Harry T. Sidway, incorporated the Sidway Manufacturing Co., which established the factory in Elliston.
