

Hoosiers and Ducks Will Clash In Final Game of Series This Afternoon

HOOSIERS WILL HILL ON MOUND DEFEAT SAGINAW

Grodick's Single in the First Inning Gives Locals One Run Needed to Win the Ball Game.

Herbert Hill held the Hoosier flock of Ducks to four scratch hits in the Friday matinee and the third straight game was taken from the Saginaw band. The Hoosiers got to Johnny Jones for six singles, five of which were bunched in two periods and pushed over four runs which brought the final count up as 4-0.

Hill was invincible from the start and the Ducks could not touch the heavy Texan's spitters and speed balls. In but one round did Herbert weaken and that was the sixth when he acceded the visitors two free passes in succession. This slight sign of wavering inspired the Hoosiers to step out and grab three more runs in the same stanza in order to make their victory safe.

Bashchang started for the Ducks with a drive at short which was nabbed by Edmiston. Grodick took Neale's hopper one handed and bunched him while Varley fouled out to Lake. Broder beat out a slow one hit to Varley. The Ducklet fielded the ball but in his anxiety to catch Bert threw wild and the Hoosier advanced to second. Koehler was walked and suffered from Holmes, whereupon he jauntily waved his hand at the Saginaw pilot, his ancient rival and enemy. Koefhagen hit a slow one to Barry and was taken at first on the throw to Jones.

Neale opened the fourth by beating out another bunt along the white line. Koefhagen made a pretty catch of Varley's fly. Fournier and Neale was murdered by Lake when he attempted to steal. Stupp grounded out to Edmiston. It was three up and three down for the Hoosiers.



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BATTERS CANNOT WASTE ANY TIME GUESSING HURLER

Heaviest Hitters in Big Leagues Do Not Try to Out-Figure the Pitcher — What Fournier Says About It.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The batter who tries to outguess a pitcher never lands in the 300 class. Such a player has his mind concentrated on what the pitcher is going to throw more than he has on the natural object of his visit to the plate—to hit the ball.

Jacques Fournier of the White Sox the 1915 batting sensation of the American league, furnishes an excellent example of what happens to a batter who tries to outguess the pitcher—and one who doesn't. Cobb, Jackson, Wagner, Collins, Lajoie, Speaker and the other famous hitters of the present era of baseball, don't try to outguess a pitcher. They swing at every good ball that comes along, not worrying about how it is going to break. But they've always followed that course. Fournier's case is different.

In 1912 Fournier hit for 234. Up to mid-season in 1914 he didn't hit much better than 250.

"And then I took a tumble to myself," said Fournier. "All along I had been working on the theory that a successful batter was one who outguessed the pitcher. Every time I'd step to the plate I'd try to figure out in advance what the pitcher was going to throw and then I'd set myself for such a delivery."

Would Not Work. Sometimes I did outguess the pitcher. Often I didn't. But I always was worried over the uncertainty of the guessing game. Had I guessed wrong, or was I right? The continual worry took my mind off the fact that I was in there to bat—not to play a guessing game.

"Well, one day last summer we stacked up against Walter Johnson. I figured I was going to try to outguess him so I just walked up to the plate and batted away at what he served up to me. I made two home runs that day. Ever since I have not been trying to do any out-guessing. I keep in mind only one thing when I go to the plate—that I must hit the ball. I think that system has been a success."

It surely has. Fournier started off a whirlwind pace and he has been maintaining it. He swung into May with a batting mark around 450 and has entered June with very little of it shrunken away. If he maintains his present clip he will have a 500 average for the year.

Armando Unhappy. Armando Marsans gets a daily salary sufficient to buy him 840 cool and foaming lager beers, he doesn't have to do one tap of work, and yet he is very, very unhappy.
