## CHILDREN'S DAY IS OBSERVED IN CHURCHES

### Baptists Have Interesting Program From Work of Baptist Publication Society—Other Programs.

A very interesting and pleasing program was carried out Sunday evening by the Sunday school departments of the First Baptist church in observance of Children's day. The entertainment was well attended.

The program given was in the nature of a resume of the work and methods of the American Baptist Publication Society since its organization. This society does the American missionary work for the Baptist church by a method and on a scale that is not surpassed by any other denomination in this country.

Beginning in an evolutionary manner, the chart showed that 141 colporters—Sunday school, missionaries on foot, are now at work. Forty-three Sunday school and Young People's society directors and organizers; several chapel cars, fully equipped to carry on services in communities where Baptist churches have not been located; 58 colporter wagons, 11 colporter automobiles and three colporter cruisers.

## FIND BODY OF JOHN ORDOG NEAR BRIDGE

The body of John Ordog, who was drowned last Tuesday morning in the St. Joseph river near the Mishawaka dam, was found Sunday morning and rescued from the waters by his brother, Anthony Ordog of Hammond, Ind., and one companion. The body was located just near the bridge where he was last seen. This part of the river had been dragged time and time again by the police officials, but the hooks failed to reveal him.

However, when the body was removed from the water, several marks were found which led the police to believe that the drags had caught his clothes at different times, but owing to the position of the body, did not hold fast. The men worked nearly 15 minutes Sunday morning in getting the body to the shore. He was taken to the Finch and Sprague morgue to be prepared for burial.

Ordog was the first victim of the river for this year. He had been fishing with several companions early Tuesday morning in the rocks below the dam, and it is thought that he slipped from one of the big rocks into a hole, near which he was fishing. He was last seen near the bridge. The police searched every morning, until Friday, but failed to be rewarded for their efforts.

He is survived by his parents, wife and two children, and several brothers and sisters in his native land, Hungary. He has been a resident of Mishawaka for the past seven years.

Coroner Swantz held the inquest Sunday morning and gave a verdict of accidental death by drowning. The funeral will be held from the Finch and Sprague chapel Monday morning.
