

LANSING ORDERS ARMY FROM NAGO

Secretary of State Tells Carranza to Take Troops from Neutral Ground.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Sec'y of State Lansing telegraphed Gen. Carranza today that his troops must be withdrawn from Nago, which they entered in violation of the agreement made by Gen. Villa and Carranza's representatives with Gen. Hugh Scott, chief of staff of the United States army.

Officials of the general staff of the United States army who are setting reports about the present Carranza-Villa campaign say that the chances appear to be in favor of the military success of Villa. They say that Gen. Obregon has been caught between the Zapatistas who have reoccupied Mexico City and Gen. Villa's flying column. Others say he has been caught between the flying column and the main army of Gen. Villa and that he cannot escape. They express the opinion that neither Obregon nor Gonzales can fight successfully as they are both isolated and cut off from any base of supplies.

According to the army opinion Gen. Villa will soon be in control not only of northern Mexico, but of southern Mexico, and will again shut up Carranza in his only stronghold, the city of Vera Cruz.

The Carranza agency here gave out this afternoon a telegram from Charles A. Douglas of Washington, now in Vera Cruz with Carranza that "up to Saturday evening the constitutional and hostile had distributed a million pesos of money to the poor of Mexico, thus giving aid to 40,000 families."

The state department has a dispatch stating that on the 19th of the municipal authorities of Cananea left the town and that there was great disorder accompanied by fires, but that the Carranza troops under Gen. Calles arrived on the 20th and restored order.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 23.—Lamar Brey, son of a prominent Memphis family, and Miss Mabelle Daley, a society girl, were killed some time after midnight when Brey's automobile overturned in Riverside park. Their bodies were found under the automobile by a park policeman early Friday.

SALAZAR IS AGAIN PLACED IN CUSTODY

EL PASO, Tex., July 23.—Gen. Jose Inez Salazar, who escaped from Fort Wingate, N. M., last November and was re-arrested near Columbus, N. M., has been brought back to this city by United States officers.

Salazar was prominent during the period that Pascual Orozco was at the head of the revolutionary troops in Chihuahua. He afterwards took the field as commander of Huerta's army in Chihuahua.

He was arrested on the charge of conspiracy to violate the United States neutrality laws. He was tried at Santa Fe, acquitted of the neutrality charge, but was re-arrested by United States army officers and returned to Fort Wingate.

Following his escape he started an independent revolution in the mountains of western Chihuahua.

PROPOSE SCHEME TO SAVE EUROPE

Security League With Wanamaker President Would Buy Belgium and Restore Government.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 23.—John Wanamaker, addressing 150 prominent business and professional men who afterward organized the Philadelphia branch of the National Security League and elected him its president, proposed the government of the United States take the following actions to restore Europe to normal:

Borrow from every available source the sum of one hundred billions of dollars with which to purchase Belgium from Germany, restore its government and sovereignty and then when suitable return it to its people.

Establish high duties on both exports and imports so that the United States would be entirely independent commercially and otherwise from Europe. Under such conditions the belligerent nations without cotton, foodstuffs and munitions would be forced to stop fighting.

Justly resent the insult that desires us to ask permission to do business which we are already entitled to under the laws of nations and make the whole world understand that the American flag is more than a symbol, but that it is something to be glorified the world over.


