DEATH CAUSE DATES TO FRISCO EARTHQUAKE. Miss Anna Geiss Dies as Result of Nervous Shock Sustained in 1906.

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., July 24.—Thirteen hundred convicts went wild with enthusiasm here Friday afternoon when they were privileged to witness a complete performance of Hove's Great London shows, given in the open on the baseball diamond within the walls of the Indiana State prison.

It was the first sight of a circus for at least 200 of the prisoners, according to the statement of Warden Edward J. Fogarty, upon whose invitation the circus came to Michigan City, and there 200, many of them old men serving life sentences, got all the enjoyment out of the event that is given to any child at his first circus performance.

Shout Seives Hoarse. One gray-haired convict, serving the 28th year of a life sentence, was among the most enthusiastic of the crowd of cheering, excited spectators. He, with his mates, shouted his loudest and loudest shout of himself hoarse at the thrilling feats of the performers.

For two hours the prisoners kept up their demonstration of appreciation, giving the members of the circus troupe the greatest ovation in the history of circus acting.

Peals of laughter greeted the efforts at entertainment presented by the clowns, who, to many of the audience, were the most interesting part of the circus. Spirits grown heavy through many years behind prison walls were lightened for two hours, while 140 actors and actresses made special efforts to please the 1,300 spectators.

Girl Riders Make Hit. The girl horseback riders of the company were given special demonstrations by the convicts, with whom the sight of a woman is a rare occurrence. 

CONVICTS WATCH CIRCUS ACTORS

Prisoners at Michigan City Are Given Big Treat by Warden Fogarty.

GIVES ELEVEN WAYS OF REFORMING WORLD

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—Eleven steps that must be taken to regenerate the world were revealed by Dr. Elizabeth Hamilton Muncie, author and lecturer of Brooklyn, N. Y., in an address before the ninth International Purify Congress in the Municipal Auditorium here.

"Equal suffrage is the chief hope of the world," said Mrs. Muncie. "The sturdy oak has become decayed at the core; the clinging vine must now become the sturdy oak." What suffrage for women will bring is enumerated in the following 11 reforms:

- 1. Recognition of men's spiritual as well as physical and mental age. 2. Personal purity for man and woman. 3. Preservation of the integrity of the home. 4. Home teaching. 5. Compulsory sex teaching in the public schools. 6. Compulsory reporting of diseases of children by parents. 7. Compulsory certificates of health before marriage. 8. Sterilization of criminals. 9. Establishment of vocational hospitals. 10. Suppression of traffic in liquor, tobacco and drugs. 11. Annihilation of the social evil.

200,000 JEWS MADE HOMELESS

Letters Received Show Order Was Given by Russian Military Authorities.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Translations from letters just received here show that numerous expulsions of Jews from various districts of Poland were followed late in May by an order of the Russian military authorities that about 200,000 Jews be driven from their homes.
