

Joe Jackson's Purchase By White Sox--Banker is Winner of Chicago Shoot

CLARKE FIRST IN GRAND AMERICAN HANDICAP SHOOT

Banker Goes Into Triple Tie for Lead With 96 Out of 100, Then Takes Shoot-off.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—L. B. Clarke of Chicago, won the Grand American Handicap, the year's premier trap shooting event Friday in Grant park when after tying with three others at 96 out of 100 targets, he broke 29 straight in the shoot-off. Clarke is not a seasoned shooter and this makes his performance all the more noteworthy. He has been following the clay birds since for only about a year, although previously he had been an ardent sportsman. Clarke is vice president of the Hibernian bank and holds the same office in the Sportsman's club of America.

The three men who tied with Clarke were M. E. Dewey of Hampton, Ind., C. C. Hickman of Yeoman, Ind., and J. J. Randall of Greensburg, Kan. Clarke and Dewey shot from the 13-yard line, while the others were stationed at the 19-yard mark.

Leaders Get \$661.10.
The four leaders each received \$661.10, of the G. A. H. purse. In addition Clarke was awarded a chest of silver. Six men with scores of 93 carried away \$288.44 each. They were E. W. Anderson, J. H. Ferry, A. Gilson, C. R. Helm, P. L. Heinecke and C. W. Irgang. Eleven men finished with scores of 94 and seven with cards of 93.

Shooting Friday was under the most trying conditions. Throughout Thursday the contestants were bothered by a good breeze blowing diagonally across the traps, but today it was nearly a calm.

Consolation to Milwaukee Man.
The consolation handicap was won by H. Hammett of Milwaukee, after a shoot-off with Sam Lever, the former baseball pitcher. Both finished the 100-bird event with cards of 95. In a shoot-off for third place, Cass D. Lidstone of Youngstown, Okla., won by breaking 26 straight. The winner of the consolation received \$145, second man took \$130.50 and third man \$115.

The professionals staged a race for the Henry Stanford trophy and R. O. (Pop) Heik carried away the bacon. Six men entered and Taylor was eliminated with a score of 87 on a 100-bird shoot. In the trophy contest, which was also at 100 targets, Heik broke 96, Bart Lewis was second with 95, E. S. Graham third with 94, Lester German fourth with 93 and C. S. Spencer last with 92.

MONTEREAL, Que., Aug. 21.—The \$5,000 King George stake for 2:08 trotters, carded as the feature race of the Grand Circuit program at Dorval park Friday, proved a tame race, owing to the small number of starters and the fact that the sensational horse Peter Scott outclassed the field.

The most thrilling heat of the day came in the 2:08 pace in which the half mile track star Yedna, was favorite, but in the third Walter Cox cut loose with Billy Dale, also a half mile track star, and the favorite only beat him a head in 2:02 1-2, within a second of the Canadian record.

The 2:10 trot went five heats with Lizzie Brown the winner, Bonington, the favorite, only getting fourth money.
