

New Record is Made at Indianapolis Track—Forster Wins Y. M. Trophy

GEERS WINS TWO \$2,000 STAKES IN HARTFORD MEET

Takes 2:10 Pace and Three-Year-Old Trot With Ease—Pardee Files Appeal.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 9.—The veteran driver, "Pop" Geers, was the star redman at Charter Oak park Wednesday, landing two of the four races, both of them \$2,000 stakes.

Judge Ormonde, a double heat winner having been disqualified for fouling Geers' mount and the others ruled out for not winning a heat in five, only Hal Boy and Russell Boy were left to finish the race.

Margaret Druien outclassed the others in the 2:04 trot and Single G, was by far the best in the stake for 2:08 pacers, all of the races being won in straight heats.

Barton Pardee, owner of Judge Ormonde, who was disqualified for fouling Russell Boy in the 2:10 pace Wednesday, filed an appeal from the decision of the judges on the case and the matter will be taken to the board of review for settlement.

M'LOUGHLIN AND BUNDY LOSE FOR FIRST TIME

Doubles Pair Are Taken Into Camp in Brilliant Tennis by Johnston and Griffin.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—For the first time since 1912 when he and Thomas G. Bundy defeated the national doubles championship from Raymond D. Little and Gustave F. Touchard, M'Loughlin and his partner were defeated. They were defeated by William M. Johnston and Clarence J. Griffin. The score was 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, 3-6, 6-2.

Johnston opened the match with his service and in the first game M'Loughlin and Bundy failed to score a single point. But in all of the following ones with the exception of the fifth game they reeled off point after point and won the set six games to two.

In this set Bundy's craftiness was evidenced. He shot the ball down the center of the court and through the slightest openings for points which did not even draw a return, and caught Johnston and Griffin in a position where neither made an effort to send the ball back. That is the way he placed his uncanny thrusts—his opponents each thought that the other would make the play.

Johnston and Griffin won the second set at 6-3 and won the first game by breaking through the comet's high bounding service. In the following set they dropped four games and went into the lead at two sets to one.

In the fourth set M'Loughlin again serving the opening game Johnston and Griffin wavered momentarily before the opposition's furious attack and lost 2-6. It was due to the comet's irresistible overhead smashing that the ultimate losers won this match.

The last and deciding match was replete with some of the best rallies of the entire tournament.

FORSTER WINS "Y" TROPHY AGAIN

Thorward Unable to Stop Fast, Driving Game After First Set.

Herbert Forster was returned tennis champion yesterday afternoon when he defeated George Thorward in the finals in the Y. M. C. A. tourney for the Calvin Clauer trophy, winning in straight sets, 7-5, 6-2, 6-0. In only the first set did Thorward make a showing against last year's champion. He was entirely outclassed and bewildered by Forster's play in the last two sets.

Thorward led through the first set, meeting Forster's fast smashes and high volleys with drives that took the victor off his feet. With the games 4-2 against him, Forster evened the count, Thorward taking the next.

In the tenth game Forster was fighting hard and playing soundly. Thorward went into deuce, and at three different times Thorward needed only one point to win the set. Forster, however, finally won the game tying the set up with five games all. He started in to play at this point, and Thorward seemed to weaken and the local champion took two straight games and the set without allowing his adversary a single point.

Single Point Set. Forster went strong in the second set, Thorward managing finally to edge in two games after Forster had it practically won. In the final and deciding set, Forster won six straight games, many of them love.

Thorward's aggressive returns in the first set caused Forster no little difficulty, and it was not until play had been more than half over that Forster solved the attack. Thorward played consistently for the back line keeping his younger opponent away from the net with his accurate drives. Forster in turn volleyed well but was erratic during the first few games. He changed this method of attack later, driving for Thorward's backhand, which proved the weakest spot that the loser had.

Play Begins Fast. Play was fast and furious during the first set, both players going the limit to win points. Fast net play characterized Thorward's work in the early stages of the contest. Forster on the other hand played a brilliant game, his deep smashes and drives coming over the net so hard that they caused Thorward to return poorly. Thorward double faulted repeatedly in the last two sets, presenting Forster with many games. The winner however faulted only once, and his swift service often proved dazzling to Thorward. He varied his serve repeatedly.

Forster's victory yesterday gives him a better hold on the Clauer trophy which he has now won two years straight. He must win the cup another season before he becomes entitled to permanent possession of it.

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GEN. TODD BREAKS WORLD'S RECORD FOR 3-YEAR-OLDS

Pittsburgh Colt Wins Western Horseman Stake of \$3,500 Stepping Distance in 2:04 1-4.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 9.—Gen. Todd, a Pittsburgh colt, broke the world's record for 3-year-olds in the Western Horseman stake at the state fair Wednesday afternoon. The time was 2:04 1-4. The purse was \$3,500.

In the second heat Gen. Todd raced the quarters in :30 1-2; 1:01 1-2; 1:33 1-4, and the mile in 2:04 1-4. The 2:25 first division pace, Miss Patsy won the second division pace, Red Ring took the 2:25 trot and Fleeta Dillon the 2:07 pace.
