

The Modern Alexander Need Not Sigh, He Must Face Those Boston Red Sox

HARPER COACHES HIS TEAM BACK OF CLOSED GATE

Notre Dame Mentor Makes Shifts in Line Preparatory to Big Clash With Haskell Indians.

Three important shifts were made in the lineup of the Notre Dame varsity eleven by Coach Harper in yesterday afternoon's workout on Cartier field.

John Miller, who made such a good showing in the fullback position, when he was sent into the Alma game in the final quarter last Saturday, was shifted to right halfback on the first team and Malone was moved to same position on the second eleven. Phelan, whose running of the team in the final quarter against Alma was a feature of the game was in the quarterback position and Hugh O'Donnell replaced Rydzewski at center on the first eleven. "Ducky" Holmes, who was kept out of Saturday's game because of an injured shoulder, was back at tackle on the first team and if his injury has healed sufficiently, the veteran will undoubtedly be used in that position against the Haskell Indians.

Miller at Half.

Coach Harper has considered placing Miller at fullback on the first eleven and moving Bachman to right halfback. Miller, however, underwent an operation last June and he has not been feeling just as well as he might be. For this reason Harper decided not to try the shift.

It now looks as though there will be a hot fight for the right halfback and quarterback positions on the first team. Malone, the last year's freshman, played a good game at right halfback last Saturday and he will give Miller a real battle for the position. "Young Duteh" Bergman, who piloted the team during the first three quarters against Alma, will also give Miller a battle for the quarterback job. Bergman got away with some pretty runs in Saturday's game, while Phelan's generalship was a feature.

O'Donnell Gets Try.

O'Donnell, who supplanted Rydzewski at center last night, subbed for Capt. Fitzgerald at the pivot position last year. He has been putting up a classy game this fall and Coach Harper has decided to give him a try at the position filled by the big sophomore last Saturday.

Another shift worthy of note was the placing of Andres, heretofore an end, at fullback position on the second eleven. Andres is a husky lad and with considerable coaching, should develop into a good substitute for Bachman.

Practices Secret.

In fact, the Notre Dame mentor has let it be known that all practices will be secret for an indefinite period, perhaps two weeks at least, and that the members of the varsity and freshmen squads, coaches and newspaper men were barred from the field.

A stranger appeared on Cartier field during the practice and was ordered off the lot by Coach Harper.

Assistant Coach Rockne, who attended the Illinois-Haskell game at Urbana last Saturday, returned and gave a number of the Indians' plays to Coach Jones, the freshman team. Jones instructed his men in the formations yesterday and they will probably be used by the yearlings in scrimmage against the varsity this week.

TWO GAMES SLATED

Notre Dame Yearlings to Clash With Pair of Schools.

Two games have been scheduled for the Notre Dame freshmen eleven according to announcement made by Director of Athletics Harper yesterday.

Jones' yearlings will clash with Culver Military academy at Culver Oct. 23 and the week following, they will play St. Viator's college at Kankakee.

FED STAR HERE TO SEE FRIEND

Leslie Mann of Chicago Champ Team Visits Coach Metzler of High Team.

Leslie Mann, a member of Chicago's pennant winning team of the Federal league, stopped off in this city yesterday to visit C. A. Metzler, physical director and athletic coach at the local high school.

Mann is traveling from Chicago, which city he left at 11 o'clock a. m. yesterday for Springfield, Mass., where he will attend Springfield Training college of the Y. M. C. A.

Mann arrived in South Bend late yesterday afternoon and at once inquired for Metzler and he was directed to Leeper park where Metzler was drilling his squad.

When Mann arrived unnoticed to Metzler he fell in behind the team and looked on at the practice. Metzler was in the act of "hawking" out a member of the team for poor playing, when Mann said:

"Well, Metz! That's just like you used to do it."

"What's that," said Metzler, who recognized Mann's voice, ran over to him. Metzler left the football team at the field and went riding with Mann, in his big Lexington machine, which car he is driving on his trip.

Metzler was captain of the Springfield team back in 1911, and playing fullback, he played alongside of Mann who was quarter that year.

According to Metzler, Mann was the star of the team, for being a ten-second man on the cinder path, he could travel in football tops. That year Springfield met the Carlisle Indians who then boasted of the mighty Jim Thorpe, and the game resulted into a match between Thorpe and Mann. The Indians were victorious, Thorpe making all their points totaling 30, against 29 for Mann.

Last year Mann was a member of Boston's world champions and after jumping to the Feds he became a member of another winning team.

In last Sunday's games Chicago and Pittsburgh were fighting it out and because in the first game when Mann in left, and Zwilling in center field, muffed up a fly ball that enabled Pittsburgh to tie them, and later pass them. Mann told Metzler that in the second tilt of the afternoon which meant the pennant or third place, and all on his account, "he lost ten pounds by worry, and got 40 more gray hairs."

Mann will resume his trip this afternoon, after spending the day with Metzler.

A state-wide campaign has been started for the purpose of interesting all former students of that state university in this game and the prospects are that there will be a record breaking crowd present at the game.

It is expected that Pres't Wilson will witness the game inasmuch as he will be present in Indianapolis on the day previous to attend a teachers' convention. It is planned to have a box erected at each end of the football field and the president will occupy the box at the Indiana end during one-half of the game and the box at the Washington and Lee end during the other half.

In working up an attendance for the game a chairman has been appointed for each county. Elmer Peak has charge of the arrangements in this county. A special train probably will be run over the Lake Erie road for the transportation of St. Joseph county alumni.

WILL RACE 300 MILES

Shorter Distance Expected to Prove More Popular.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 5.—The Memorial day international speedway race in 1916 will be a 300-mile contest instead of 500 miles, as has been the distance since the annual holiday derby was inaugurated, several years ago. Carl G. Fisher, president of the Indianapolis speedway, made the announcement of the change.

"The shorter race would be more popular with the public," said Fisher. The prizes for the race will be \$30,000 instead of \$50,000.

PHILLIES PLACE THEIR HOPES ON ONE ALEXANDER

Hurler is Expected to Stop the Red Sox—Demaree May Spring Surprise if He is Given a Chance.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—"The classiest" pitching staff that ever battled under one standard versus a pitching staff composed of one real star and several ordinary twirlers—that's the way the Red Sox and Phillies size up in pitching departments.

But the overwhelming advantage of the Red Sox in its defensive department, as a whole, is minimized by the fact that in a world series the pitching department of the Phillies must be considered practically equal to that of the Red Sox in the short world series clash.

Grover Cleveland Alexander stands out today as the greatest defensive pitcher in the game. The Sox have a wonder hurler in Joe Wood, yet even Wood must yield first place to the pitching star of the Phillies.

Depends on Alex.

Upon the mighty arm of Alexander will rest the hopes of the Phillies supporters. And Alexander, if right, certainly will justify the confidence that is placed in him, because the game never has known a pitcher who, in a crisis, could rise to such sublime heights.

Alexander has asked to work in the first four games of the series—but Mer. Pat Moran has turned down this amazing request. Moran believes that Alex could stand up under the terrific strain of pitching four games in a row, and he feels that if Alex did work in those four games it probably would clinch the pennant for the Phillies. But he knows that the strain ultimately would tell—that it would shorten Alexander's career as a pitcher.

Alexander, undoubtedly, will pitch the opener and will be sent to the mound again for the third game. The result of the duelling up to that time will decide Moran as to when to work Alex again.

Demaree May Spring Surprise.

Demaree probably will get a chance at the Phillies—and when "Steamer Al" is going good he's one of the best little pitchers in the game. Demaree is somewhat erratic in pitching. One day he will pitch a shut-out game. The next day he will yield a dozen hits. The Red Sox may bat him all over the lot when he starts—and Demaree may shut them out. At any rate, it's a good gamble for Moran to shove Demaree at the Phillies for the second game, using Mayer or Rixey, the huge southpaw, for the fourth game.

Mer. Bill Carrigan just now is in a quandary as to which man to work in the opening combat. Bill's choice isn't made for him as is Moran's. He's got six twirlers, every one on edge, and every one of almost equal skill.

Wood If Arm is Right.

Wood, if Arm is right, in real condition Carrigan probably will send "Smoky" against Alexander. If it isn't, Shore, a youngster, may get the honor.

When Veon Gregg is in condition there isn't a better left hander in the country. But Gregg's arm has been ailing all year, and Carrigan may not work him. George Foster and Dutch Leonard, seem sure of getting the start in the series, especially if the series is a long one. "Big Boy" Ruth, the youngster, will be held in reserve for relief work—and for pinch hitting purposes.

Ruth Real Slugger.

Ruth is one of the best hitters on the club and easily the greater slugger. He has smashed out nine doubles, one triple and four home runs during his infrequent appearances at the bat, and he will come in handy in pinches.
