## MAC MARTIN TO ADDRESS ADMEN

### National Figure in Advertising World to Speak Here Thursday Night.

One of a half dozen of the biggest men in the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World is Mac Martin of Minneapolis, Minn., who originated the departmental plan of reorganizing advertising clubs in hundreds of cities throughout the United States and foreign countries. Mr. Martin will speak before the Ad-Sell League at the Oliver Hotel in South Bend on Thursday evening, and the officials of the club are shaking hands with themselves now at being able to secure him for an address.

The October banquet of the league will be served at 6:30 o'clock, and an interesting program will follow. Several features, including some entertainment of a lighter vein, will be featured on the program. E. G. Weir of Dowagiac, Mich., will preside. Mr. Martin became a national figure in the advertising business during 1914 and this year, while president of the Minneapolis Advertising Forum, when he set about to revolutionize the organization of ad clubs. He did not believe the tens of thousands of advertising men over the country were getting what they wanted at the meetings of their various organizations. He felt that they were not securing the benefits from their gatherings that they should. He sprung the plan on the Minneapolis club, and had it working nicely when it came time for the national convention in Chicago this summer.

Delegates to this convention liked the Minneapolis plan, and it was given the cordial endorsement of the national organization. Since then, it has been installed in clubs everywhere. The Ad-Sell league here was one of the first to go over to the departmental plan. Mr. Martin will tell the local membership some about it in his Thursday evening address.

Besides having been president of the Minneapolis club, Mr. Martin is president of the Mac Martin Advertising agency, chairman of the educational research committee of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, and is a professional lecturer on advertising in the university of Minnesota.

## FOOD PLANS COMPLETED

### Much Grain Will be Reserved for Stock Feeding Purposes.

BERIN (By wireless via Sayville), Oct. 25.—Plans for the control of food and food prices by the imperial government of Germany have practically all been mapped out; it was announced today through the Overseas News agency.

A considerable amount of the grain crop will be reserved for stock feeding purposes. A separate government office has been created for the distribution of the potato crop, which is very big this season.

A price list fixing the maximum amounts which may be charged for provisions is being made up. Special care will be taken in regard to milk for babies and the sick.

Butter cards will be issued similar to those issued for bread earlier in the war.

### Plans Call For the Widening of Ewing Av.

The assessment roll and final estimate for the widening of Ewing av. from Michigan st. to Fellows st., has been filed with the board of works. The total assessment amounts to \$918.60. Ten feet of ground will be taken from property on the south side of the street for widening purposes.

The assessment roll and final report for the widening of Webster st., from Prairie av. to Indiana av., and from Webster st. to Prairie av., was also filed with the board. The land will be taken from property on both sides of Webster st., and from the north side of Indiana av. The total assessment amounts to \$740.

Hearings on the two reports probably will take place early in December.

## RULE FAVORS PLAINTIFF

### Cannell City Oil Co. Gets Verdict For \$625.

Judge Ford ruled in favor of the plaintiffs Monday morning in the case of the Cannell City Oil Co. vs. Ella M. Roper to collect \$625 on a note. The case went to the jury Friday night but it returned a faulty verdict, not designating the amount of damages due the oil company. They reported the finding in the belief that that latter fact should be established by the court.

The finding of the court was based on similar cases settled by the appellate court. The defendants took an objection to the finding which was overruled by the court. The note was held to be due in the sum of \$625, interest which would have raised it to \$640, the total amount asked for in the complaint, being remitted. This was done on motion of attorneys for the plaintiffs.

## TWO ASK FOR DIVORCES

### Wife Says Husband is Fugitive From Justice.

Charging that her husband was at the present time a fugitive from justice, that he had served four years in the penitentiary which she did not know about previous to their separation, Lottie Timming brought suit in superior court Monday morning to secure divorce from August Timming. She asks the return of her maiden name as well.

Joseph Plummer of Lakeville asks for a divorce from Irene Plummer. His petition was filed in the superior court Monday morning. According to court records, they were married in March, 1905, and separated Oct. 23, 1915. He charges his wife with infidelity, and asks for a complete divorce and custody of their one child.

## NEITHER PARTY PRESENT

### Case in City Court is Continued Till Tuesday.

Neither the defendant nor the plaintiff appeared in city court Monday morning when the assault and battery case against Francis Janowick, 617 S. Walnut st., filed by Mary Kruszev, was called. Deputy Pros. Dan Nye asked that the trial be set for Thursday and that the police call the defendant into court.

## SEEKS TO FORECLOSE.

Proceedings to foreclose a mortgage and collect on a promissory note were started in circuit court Monday morning the complaint being filed. The First Trust and Savings bank is named as plaintiffs while Jennette Bolln et al, is the defendant. Judgment of \$500 is asked with the foreclosure of the mortgage to satisfy the claims of the bank.
