MOISTURE OUTSIDE VS. MOISTURE INSIDE

Condition of Bottle Used to Determine Guilt of Saloon Arrested For Sunday Selling.

What becomes of the arctic moisture on the outside of a beer bottle taken from the ice box of a "smoky row" saloon while enroute to the police station; is it possible for the moisture to become absorbed into the paper or the cloth of a coat pocket; would it be likely to remain on the outside of the bottle had it been taken to a rear hallway of the Theophile Van Turnhout saloon on N. Main st., were some of the questions which were put to the witnesses of the state, Patrolman Turbush, on the stand by both the attorneys for the state and the defendant in the case of Van Turnhout in the city police court Friday morning on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday.

Van Turnhout was arrested several days ago on the charge of selling a bottle of beer to Ross Thompson of this city, late of North Anderson, Ind., and several other towns in the vicinity.

The purpose of the above questions was to discover if it wouldn't have been possible for Thompson to have purchased the beer elsewhere and to have taken it to the Van Turnhout saloon and drink it. Turbush in answering the questions insisted that the cool moist condition of the bottle almost made it impossible for Thompson to have secured it in any other place than that of Van Turnhout. However, the officer failed to qualify as an expert in determining the possibilities.

After the witnesses of both sides were heard and the pleas of both attorneys were made, Van Turnhout was found guilty by Judge Feig of the charge and was given a fine of \$5 and costs, amounting to \$35. An appeal was taken to the circuit court. He was placed under \$50 bonds.

SPARK IGNITES ROOF; \$100 DAMAGES RESULT

A spark from a chimney at the residence of John Brandstrat, 2419 Lincoln way W., Friday morning caused damages of \$100 to the roof of the building before the arrival of the fire department.

When the department arrived, after a run of over two miles, the roof was found to be burning briskly and for a time it appeared that the damages would be considerable. However quick action on the part of the men in getting water to the blaze soon extinguished it.

Mishawaka the past few days seems to be experiencing an epidemic of fires. There have been no less than 12 fires in less than two weeks. All were more or less of a dangerous nature and the departments are given much credit for their work in preventing any great losses. The motor truck is of no mean importance in the efforts of the men as its timely arrival on several occasions is all that saved some of the structures.
