FRANK BOGI AGAIN IN COURT; GOES TO JAIL

Frank Bogi, often into court and a character well known to the police, was found guilty of a charge of assault and battery on one Joe Truhowski Friday morning by City Judge Feig and was given a fine of \$5 and costs, amounting to \$15, which he was unable to pay. Bogi was sent to jail where he will lay out the fine and costs. Bogi pleaded not guilty when arraigned Thursday morning, but the testimony of witnesses for the state convinced the judge as to the credibility of the defendant's judgment not being worthy of more than a fine and costs.

The fine and costs and jail sentence were suspended on her promise of good behavior. The court subscribed a fund to send her back to a position at Michigan City.




