NINE COLLEGES REPRESENTED ON ALL-EAST TEAM

Cornell and Pittsburgh Only Two to Have More Than One Man Honored. Team Star One.

There were at least a half dozen truly great football machines in the east this past season but none, outside of Cornell and Pittsburgh, possessed more than one player who outshone the other rivals for places on the first eleven.

Looking at that first team from various angles we feel that it is a real team—one that sizes up as an all-star aggregation. With Barrett, Mahan, Mayer and Hastings back of the line, with Higgins and Shelton guarding the wings and with Peck to pass the ball and assist White, Spears, Witherspoon and Abell in hounding back the enemy's rushes, we feel that our all-eastern outfit can triumph over any other all-eastern outfit in the country.

WISCONSIN COACH OUT

Board Accepts the Resignation of Bill Juneau.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 2.—The resignation of Bill Juneau, coach of the university of Wisconsin football and baseball teams, was accepted today by the university board of regents. The future of athletics at the university of Wisconsin is now in the hands of the regents, who are determined to make a complete investigation. They appointed Regents McMahon of Madison, J. Buck Staff of Oshkosh, and Faust of Eau Claire, a committee to make the investigation. There has been general dissatisfaction with the athletic department for several years and the disastrous football season just closed has brought the matter to a head.



SEVENTEEN MEN SECURE LETTERS AT NOTRE DAME

Coveted Monograms Are Awarded to Football Players—McInerney to be Granted Honor.

Seventeen men will be awarded the coveted Notre Dame football monogram this year. The faculty board of athletic control at a meeting yesterday ratified the list of names recommended by Coach Harper and the letters and sweaters will be given out in the near future.

The following men were chosen to wear the insignia for work on the gridiron during the past fall: Capt. Fitzgerald, Keefe, Stephan, O'Donnell, Rydzewski, Elward, Baujan, Phelan, Coffal, Bachman, Bergman, Jones, McInerney, Kink, Whipple, John Miller and Malone.

Ten First Letters. Of the list of men to be given monograms, 10 are receiving their first football letters from the university—O'Donnell, Rydzewski, Phelan, Bergman, Jones, McInerney, King, Whipple, Miller and Malone. Six of the monogram men are backfield players; three are ends and eight are linemen. The backfield men are Phelan, Coffal, Bergman, Bachman, Miller and Malone. The ends are Elward, Baujan and Whipple, and the linemen are Capt. Fitzgerald, Keefe, Stephan, Rydzewski, O'Donnell, Jones, McInerney and King. McInerney is a South Bend boy. Three of the letter men have now been awarded their last football letters—Capt. Fitzgerald, Keefe and Elward.

Four Letter Games. The monogram games during the past fall were the Nebraska, South Dakota, West Point and Texas contests.

The team picture will be taken this afternoon at the McDonald studio and the banquet will be held within a few days. A captain for next year will be chosen at the banquet.

On the motion of Rev. Matthew Walsh, C. S. C., vice president of Notre Dame, the board voted to instruct Coach Harper to convey to George Halmes expressions of hearty appreciation of his work, on the part of the faculty board, "it appearing that only misfortune prevented him from winning a monogram."

"Ducky" is Unlucky. "Ducky," the hard luck man of the Notre Dame squad, suffered a fractured leg in practice a few weeks ago and was put out of the game for the season. He is still confined to St. Joseph's hospital and will hardly be able to leave the institution before the Christmas vacation. Halmes won a monogram as substitute lineman in 1914 and would have copped another letter this year had it not been for his injury.

Those present at the meeting of the faculty board yesterday were Frs. Walsh, C. S. C., and Burke, Prof. Benitz and Conroy and Coach Harper.

COREY CAPTAIN.

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 2.—Harold Corey of Green Bay, Wis., was today elected captain of the 1916 university of Nebraska football team. He has played tackle for two years.

At a special meeting of the association held yesterday at Notre Dame it was decided to give another dance early in January. Plans for a banquet to be given before the Christmas vacation were also discussed.
