## KNIGHTS OF TARA ENJOY BANQUET

### Judge Flannagan of Chicago Believes Europeans Here Are Loyal.

The Knights of Tara held their first banquet and entertainment at the American bid, last night. There were about 150 present. Judge P. B. Flannagan of Chicago spoke on "Our American Opportunities and Its Foreign Relations." Speaking about the attack on hypenated Americans, the speaker said:

"It is my opinion that men that come here from Europe and swear to their oath of allegiance are, generally speaking, loyal to this country and its institutions. They have been attacked before now and have survived and prospered and vindicated their citizenship. No good can come from statements that raise false charges against them."

**Speaks For Irish.**

Hon. Maurice Donnelly of Indianapolis spoke on "Ireland's Future." Mr. Donnelly made an urgent appeal to aid the "defense of Ireland fund." "We would be false to every tradition, to every principle of the Irish race, if we did not respond to the call," said Mr. Donnelly. "Every man of us should do his part individually to help the brave boys at home who stand for Ireland and against conscription. In my judgment, Ireland's last chance for liberty, for preservation, is here. We who have promised to be her friends in the hour of need must not fail to succor her now. We have helped every cause and every movement for human liberty. Let us not forget those of our own blood in the old land in the supreme hour of their trial."

A sum was raised to aid "the defense of Ireland fund," the purpose of which is to fight against conscription in Ireland.

**Select Delegates.**

Prof. Edward Burns furnished music and sang a number of Irish songs. John McTavish furnished entertainment by selections on the Irish bagpipes. William N. Bergan presided.

A call that has been issued by all Irish societies to attend a big convention of the "Irish race in America," to be held at Washington, D. C., Jan. 18 and 19, was read. William N. Bergan and Prof. Edward Burns were elected delegates and James Nelson and John C. O'Brien alternates. They will represent the local order.

## Political Gossip

From the tone of Indianapolis dispatches, Elkhart republicans should feel sorry for their activities in favor of the Hon. James E. Watson candidacy for senator, but from later news advices from Elkhart, it seems they are far from that frame of mind. New sentiment seems state wide insofar as "state wide" refers to the capital city and its vicinity. Laporte, too, is still rather solid for Watson.

Kalamazoo republicans have organized a "Smith for President" club, and activities in favor of the Michigan senator, Wm. Alden Smith, are expected to move along rapidly commencing with the first of the year. A call will be issued soon for a meeting of southern Michigan voters in favor of the Michigan solon, when officers will be elected and a permanent organization perfected. Smith workers are using news services in the southern part of the state while in the north, Charles S. Osborn is receiving a great deal of attention, and while Michigan is said to be pledged for Smith, and while, further, Smith feels a united delegation will go from that state for his candidacy, Osborn workers declare emphatically to the contrary and hold the "Michigan for Smith" song a huge mid-winter joke.

Medill McCormick of the Chicago Tribune, vice chairman of the progressive national committee, is reported to have announced, on returning from Oyster Bay, that he would work with the republican party in 1916. The Philadelphia inquirer accepts this as an indication that Mr. Roosevelt will also support the republican ticket and that the chief business of the progressive national convention, if one is held, will be to endorse the republican ticket and platform.

Democrats of Calumet county have taken the first steps toward organization of the party in Gary and the township with the naming of a committee to see that only good candidates are brought forth for commitment from the different townships. At a banquet to be held soon, the names of all candidates for commitment, for local and for the county offices will be announced.

Indiana progressives will have a state convention at Indianapolis, May 24, according to advices received here following a meeting of the state committee at the capital city Saturday. Already plans have been made for the circulation of primary petitions for candidates for state and national offices. The names of Albert J. Beveridge, Theodore Roosevelt, Hiram Johnson of California, Clifford Pinch of Pennsylvania, and John M. Parker of Louisiana, were mentioned as possibilities for president and vice president.

For governor the only one talked about was W. A. Pierson, of New Albany, and for United States senator, W. D. Headrick and Willis Bastian, of Indianapolis, and Fred Landis, of Logansport, were mentioned.

Edwin M. Lee has been elected to the state chairmanship, following the resignation of Jackson Boyd, of Greencastle. Boyd was in Indianapolis, and said he tried to find the meeting but couldn't. Ellis D. Salsbery of Indianapolis has been elected vice chairman and Henry D. Robinson, also of Indianapolis, treasurer.

"Congressman Barnhart, of Indiana," says a state gossip, "declares that he will not support Prent Wilson's recommendation for a stamp tax on bank checks. He'd make himself more votes, perhaps, if he declared that he would not support the federal tax on automobiles, for it is highly probable that more of his constituents are running autos than are issuing bank checks. Certain it is that the recious few of them are doing both."

Madison county "drys" in an omnipartisan manner are endeavoring to secure the support of candidates from that county on prohibition and temperance measures. If the candidates refuse to agree to such arrangement, the "drys" claim they will have a ticket of their own, composed of men from all parties.

Harty S. New is spending a little time in Fort Wayne, and in Fort Wayne, he found none other than Dr. T. H. Thomas of Huntington, and Dr. Thomas, as in Elkhart, was working in the interests of the Indiana Business Men's league, which, at the foundation, is none other than Hon. James E. Watson.

## AVOIDS TRAIN, IS STRUCK BY AUTO

### Mrs. John Horvath Steps in Path of Machine—Dies at Hospital.

Mrs. John Horvath, 820 W. Napier st., was struck and fatally injured by the automobile owned and driven by John T. Niezgodzki, 1929 W. Division st., at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. The accident happened near the corner of Division and Chapin sts. Mrs. Horvath died at Epworth hospital at 8:05 o'clock Monday evening.

According to the story of an eyewitness, Mr. Niezgodzki was in no way to blame for the accident.

Mrs. Horvath had been visiting at the home of a friend, Mrs. Joe Torok, 819 W. Division st., and the two women, with Mrs. Bato, started out for down town to do some shopping about 1:25 o'clock.

**Start Across Street.**

The party of women was on the south side of Division st., and wishing to cross over on the north side, they started across the street without waiting to get to the Chapin street crossing. A west bound freight train was approaching on the Grand Trunk railroad, but the women thought there was plenty of time to cross in front of the engine.

Mrs. Torok and Mrs. Bato succeeded in crossing, but Mrs. Horvath decided not to make the attempt, and stepped back directly in front of the Niezgodzki automobile, which was going east. Witnesses state that Mr. Niezgodzki was going at a very moderate speed, and that he sounded his horn several times while approaching.

**Six Ribs Broken.**

The front and rear wheels passed over Mrs. Horvath's body, fracturing six ribs on the left side and inflicting other internal injuries. She was taken home in Mr. Niezgodzki's automobile.

Dr. Oscar von Barandy and Dr. John B. Berteling were summoned, and ordered the woman taken to Epworth hospital, where her death occurred at 8:05 o'clock. Coroner T. J. Swantz will conduct an inquest today.

**Three Children In Hungary.**

Mrs. Horvath was 47 years old. She survived by her husband, John Horvath, who is employed at the Mishawaka Rubber Co. plant, and three children living in Hungary.

Mr. Niezgodzki was a member of the board of public safety under the pogary administration and was also at one time a candidate for the nomination for mayor on the democratic ticket.

### Ask Court to Say Whether Dress Is a Fit or Not

Father John Cavanaugh has accepted an invitation to address the American Irish Historical society at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, New York city, Saturday, Jan. 8. The dinner is to be complimentary to the venerable Dr. Thomas Addis Emmet, Dr. Emmet is a laetare medalist of Notre Dame university and a grand nephew of the famous Irish patriot, Robert Emmet.

Dr. Emmet is one of the most distinguished surgeons of the world and especially of plastic surgery. He is one of the world's greatest experts and has done more for the comfort and assistance of women of the world than any other man. "Doctor Emmet's Life and Career," will be the subject of Father Cavanaugh's address.

Father John B. Delaney, professor of theology in Washington, D. C., is spending the holidays at the university.

Word has just been received here that Holy Cross college in New Orleans conducted by the congregation of Holy Cross, has suffered a severe loss in a recent storm. Temporary repairs to the amount of \$300 have been made on the building and classes will resume after the holidays.

Among the changes made by Provincial Morris, while in the south, was the assigning of Father J. H. Gallagher, to Austin, Texas, as assistant to Father O'Keefe. Father Gallagher received his first appointment from Notre Dame as assistant pastor of Sacred Heart church in New Orleans.

Twelve cross-country men were on hand in the morning at the gymnasium yesterday, but owing to the absence of the coach no outside drill could be held. On investigation it was found that Rockne was in South Bend, and the track men would have a day off.

The Latin-American club of the university, composed of students living in Mexico and South America met last night and elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: Joseph Corona of Mexico, president; Jose Muncuez of Cuba, vice-president; Jorge Rodriguez San Pedro of Cuba, secretary, and Frederico Fabrega of Cuba, treasurer. The club formerly had 40 members from Mexico, but since the war the numbers have been greatly depleted and now Cuba sends more boys to the university than Mexico. The Latin-American club at the university is the only club where a foreign language is talked at the meetings. The principal object of the club is to bring the Spanish speaking boys together for little smokers and banquets.

## Notre Dame News

### Ask Court to Say Whether Dress Is a Fit or Not

Did she or didn't she? That was the question which arose in Justice Peak's court yesterday afternoon during the course of a damage suit against Pelagia Grejer, dressmaker, brought by Hattie Polimkowski. Hattie charges that Pelagia made a dress which did not fit the specifications.

Expert dressmakers, skilled in their craft and dexterous with the needle, were placed on the stand by both sides. Those for the dressmaker testified that the dress fitted, and those for Hattie testified that it didn't.

It was developed during the trial that Mrs. Polimkowski had ordered a maternity gown, and she said that the garment given her by the dressmaker was entirely unsuitable for the purpose.

The much discussed and troublesome dress was displayed in court. It was not tried on by any of the witnesses, but pins and needles and tape measures were much in evidence. The gown is of a coarse black material.

Justice Peak, being entirely unfamiliar with the methods and measurements of women's dresses, took the matter under advisement. He will render a decision Wednesday.
